A MESSAGE FROM YOUR ALUMNI PRESIDENT--Kenneth Straw

Several of the alumni remained for a short business meeting that convened immediately after vespers on Saturday night of October 21. Officers were elected for the next year. Dr. James Pickett '61 was voted president-elect, and will take office as president at next year's homecoming. Mary Charles (Scott, '46) Jones was elected treasurer. Rogene Goodge '59 was elected to serve as secretary.

Those present voted to continue to sponsor the construction of the steam tunnel during the next year. This will be the official project of the alumni association. To date, the steam tunnel project has cost \$20,654.76. The alumni have contributed \$6,896.00 towards the project.

I believe that all of you are aware of the new medical facility project that we have been forced into by the state. This is the first project that we have become involved with that has involved so many inspectors and regulations. We are now an official utility furnishing water. We also have sewage disposal problems that must meet regulations. All of this is very expensive. We are required to have additional water tank capacity to supply a fire sprinkler system, and on and on.

The steam tunnel will serve more than one purpose. It will carry the sewage disposal lines, and also some water lines. So, it will become a part of our utility system that we are required to have for the new sanitarium. At present, the tunnel is just through the parking lot behind the church. This is a little more than 2/3 of the total listance it needs to go. We already have the pipe that we were able to purchase at a bargain price. We are mixing all of the concrete in our own mixing truck, and doing the digging with our back-hoe. It is a bit slower this way, but it means that the money contributed is used only for direct materials. What better bargain could you find to contribute to?

I have a burden to see some things accomplished with the alumni association during the next year. Perhaps one would be an up-to-date directory of alumni--where they are, and what they are doing. This would be quite a bit of work, and would require participation by each one of you. Do you suppose you would be willing to answer a short questionnaire if we mailed one out? Let us know what you think. We are often asked for statistics on our alumni, but don't have any, so we might try to accumulate some statistical data for general use at the same time.

It is very difficult to keep the alumni mailing list current. We have sent out a couple of mailings with "Address Correction Requested" and have come up with many address changes that were not reported to us by you. It costs us 25¢ to receive a return address from the post office, and you can send it to us for less money--just use a little card they furnish you. Since this is part of the news letter, I better stop and save something for later.
