Simulation and Skills Labs Welcome New Manikins

Couthern's School of Nursing welcomed several new Simulators to our Simulation and Skills labs. These simulators will enhance the learning experiences for our nursing students, starting in the first semester with Fundamentals of Nursing, and continuing throughout the undergraduate nursing courses and on into the graduate program with nurse practitioner students.

Our new manikins have many lifelike features, including audible heart, lung, and bowel sounds. Students can assess vital signs, such as auscultation of blood pressure and pulse rate, and access veins for medication administration while practicing skills and simulated patient interventions.

In addition, one of the new manikins, Victoria, gives birth. Victoria can be programmed to have a normal or a complicated birth, such as a breech presentation, shoulder dystocia, or post-partum bleed. An emergency Caesarean section can also be performed on the manikin This manikin will provide the students with many situations they are not able to experience during their hospital rotations.

Victoria will prove extremely valuable to students who are practicing women's healthcare. The nurse practitioner students will be able to participate in simulated patient care scenarios where they can practice female exams and place intrauterine devices (IUDs) while interacting with the manikin.

White House COVID-19 Task Force **Member Zooms with Nursing Students**

Mark Kimmel, PhD, head of nursing response for the Federal Emergency Management Agency (FEMA),

joined Professor Jaclynn Huse's Adult Health II class via Zoom to discuss the coronavirus and its impact on our nation and the world. A top expert in emergency and disaster preparedness, Kimmel is hired through homeland security and currently sits on the task force

committee for COVID-19 at the White House with infectious diseases expert Anthony Fauci, MD.

Kimmel was very receptive to taking questions from students and discussed pathophysiology, vaccinations, and other methods of preventing transmission. Students quickly realized that they had the ear of the White House, and Kimmel made everyone feel important by showing that he cared about each one's concerns. He was kind enough to repeat this meeting for the BSN research class. In addition, the DNP program will be welcoming Kimmel as a speaker in August.

School of Nursing Receives Grant

Ardmore Institute of Health recently awarded our School of Nursing a \$14,000 grant! The funds support nursing, dietetics, and culinary arts faculty in creation of a four-session interactive Culinary Medicine Lab experience for cohorts of 12 advanced practice nursing students in the Fall 2021 and Winter 2022 semesters. Curriculum will combine reading and lectures with hands-on and chef-led cooking, team-based problemsolving, and patient-centered coaching exercises. The end goal? Preparing our nursing students to counsel patients in successful behavior change around plant-based nutrition and cooking that assists in disease management/reversal.

Part of the grant includes budget for a professional video to document the lab experiences. We hope that extracurricular component extends the benefits of the labs to assist enrollment and marketing efforts, as well.

Ardmore's leaders were so pleased with this proposal that they are already encouraging Southern to pursue more ambitious and robust collaborations with them moving forward. Thank you, Professor Lilly Tryon, DNP, and team, for your thoughtful and professional work on this project.

Community Service: COVID-19 Vaccinations Administered

Nursing faculty and students, coordinated by Professor Jill Buchholz, DNP, and Associate Professor Kerry Allen, teamed up with the Hamilton County Health Department throughout the winter semester to administer free COVID-19 vaccinations to the community, as well as to other university faculty, staff, and students.

Early in March, nursing students volunteered to administer vaccines with mentoring from the Hamilton County EMS crew at a drive-through event held at Volkswagen Nature Park. Most recently, they vaccinated 550 people on March 28 and more than 1,000 at a second event on April 18 in the parking lot at Collegedale Church of Seventh-day Adventists.

Buchholz commented: "This has been a very positive experience and an excellent opportunity for our students to serve others. Our focus at Southern is service, and we were able to show Christ at work to our community."


