The Bell Choir recently returned from a two week concert and sight-seeing tour of Poland. We traveled under the auspices of Friendship Ambassadors Foundation of New York City. The Foundation promotes good will tours primarily in Eastern European Countries, using the musical arts as its medium. Our host in Poland was Almatur, a Socialist Union of Polish Students. It was our privilege to meet many young Poles who took pride in showing off their beautiful country. All the cities we visited (Warsaw, Bialystock, Gdansk, Bydgoszcz, and Torun) had been 85-95% destroyed during WW II, but rebuilt with not only modernizing in many ways, but also preserving the flavor and appearance of centuries-old structures.

The English speaking guide, bus driver and bus, truck driver and truck to carry all the heavy bell equipment, and 33 members of the group (18 ringers and 15 others) were inseparably joined for the two weeks, all playing a vital part in the adventure.

We were especially pleased when presented our itinerary to see plans for visiting three different Adventist Churches. Sabbath morning, June 2, found us with our believers in Bialystock, near the Russian border. Through our guide, Richard, we were able to plan our participation in both S.S. and Church. Like smiles, bell ringing needs no translation so they were able to enjoy all the music. It was thrilling to sing with them in two familiar hymns, "Lift Up The Trumpet", and "Nearer My God to Thee". We shared small gifts we had brought, and also left them one of our records. The next day many of them came to hear us play in the Bialystock Philharmonic Hall. At the close of the concert, one elderly lady from the church came and presented us with a beautiful bouquet of flowers (a lovely Polish custom, we discovered). When we left Bialystock on Tuesday morning, the same dear lady arrived early at our hotel to bring us another bouquet.

Thursday afternoon, June 7, we met with our believers in Gdansk. Our itinerary stated only a "meeting", so we did not bring the bells. It was soon evident they did expect a concert, so as not to disappoint them we gave an unrehearsed choir concert with Glen Van Arsdell directing. We had a question and answer period with our guide translating. We invited them to our Bell Concert in the world famous Oliwa Cathedral that same afternoon. It was so inspiring to play in this beautiful place with its magnificent organ of 8,000 pipes. The organist allowed Glen the thrill of playing Bach's Toccata in D Minor on this glorious instrument.

Sabbath, June 9, we met with members of the Bydogszcz S.D.A. Church. Here again we participated in their services, having met the Pastor the evening before to make plans. How we instantly felt the love and joy of common beliefs! It was a feeling we shall never forget. They invited us back at 6 p.m. for tea and cakes. It was a beautiful time together, singing to each other and joining hands to sing "Side by Side" and "God Be With You Til We Meet Again".

The next morning many of the church members were at the St. Vincent a Paulo Cathedral where at least 4,000 persons heard us ring the bells.

One very solemn experience for us was a visit to Stuthof Concentration Camp. We were struck with the horror of 85,000 persons losing their lives in the gas chamber there. We left a flower memorial at the crematorium.

Many other visits and experiences too numerous to mention now, were ours as we shared our music and friendship. As the wheels of the Lot Polish Airliner touched the ground at JFK International Airport, many cheers were heard - cheers of happiness at being home after a not to be forgotten adventure. We thank God for a safe journey, good health, and the opportunity to witness for Him. We want to thank all who had a part in helping us to make this trip.
