
FOREWORD

In Memoriam

OLIVER DEWEY BALLARD

Oliver Dewey Ballard was born at the Pisgah Sanitarium, Asheville, North Carolina, May 10, 1925, and died in the Baroness Erlanger Hospital, Chattanooga, Tennessee, January 6, 1942.

When Oliver was six years old his parents moved from Pisgah to a location on Grindstone Mountain, two and one-half miles northeast of Collegedale. From this point, at the age of eight, Oliver began his school work, which continued uninterruptedly to the day of his death.

In his associations with others Oliver was friendly, and made friends, to whom he was always loyal. He believed in his friends, defended them, excused them. Oliver had a forgiving nature. He could be aroused in a flash to deep indignation because of some real or supposed wrong to himself or his friends, but he would as quickly and ardently forgive.

While in his early grades of the church school, Oliver had opportunity to visit the College Press, and from that moment there was kindled in his heart a desire to become a printer. In April of 1941, the way was opened for him to realize this desire.

The Press has lost a good worker, the College, the church and the community a studious, faithful and exemplary young student.

WOOD SHOP

A very successful industry is the wood shop. Here several thousand ironing boards, step-ladders, and unfinished furniture are manufactured each month. Under the leadership of Mr. Gepford, the volume of business has increased, and in a recent month the wood shop sales amounted to over \$20,000. It would be interesting to follow the various shipments that are made by railroad freight to various points in the United States.

The wood shop furnishes work for many students, who benefit in several ways. Work is provided for those who wish to earn a large portion of their school expenses; and they are given the opportunity of learning the methods of manufacture in the woodworking trade.

There is a large demand for other young men and young women who would like to come to Southern Junior College and earn money for a Christian education.

BROOM FACTORY

The broom shop, under the management of Mr. Gepford, provides work for about twenty-five students to earn money for their school expenses.

This has been a very busy year. Approximately three hundred dozen brooms are being turned out each week. Besides the brooms, the shop produces one hundred dozen mops a week. More mops were made and sold this year than during any previous year. Two hundred tons of broom corn and sixty thousand pounds of mop yarn were used in the making of brooms and mops.

Collegedale-made brooms are known for their quality and fine workmanship. The growth of business is so rapid that we are unable to keep pace with it; although the broom shop is operating at its utmost capacity.





HOSIERY MILL

The Collegedale Hosiery Mill, under the management of Mr. Carnahan, is one of the most modern buildings on the campus. In addition to other modern facilities, new equipment for more accurate temperature and humidity control has just been installed.

The mill has 128 new single unit nylon machines, having dispensed with the old type of machinery. Because of this change the only students employed are girls, of whom there are thirty-five. There are two shifts of workers: the college students constitute the morning shift, and the academy students the afternoon shift. These students are on three-year contracts.

THE COLLEGE PRESS

Although no freight cars or trucks are used to carry the finished product from the College Press, yet perhaps here the most interesting and educational work on the campus is done. Inside the small, neat building are located four job presses, two cylinder presses, and two monotype machines. Here also is located the office of Elder J.S. James, editor of the "Southern Tidings." Once each week this eight-page paper is set and printed entirely by student labor.

Under the leadership of Mr. Albert Hall, twelve students work all or part of their way through school and at the same time are gaining an experience which may prepare them for a career in the publishing work. Each year one boy is trained to run the monotype machine, a highly skilled job for which there is always a demand.

The print shop takes pride in composing and printing the TRIANGLE each year. Another main publication is the "Southland Scroll" which the students of Southern Junior College put out each month. Leading commercial firms of Chattanooga and vicinity have their printing done at the College Press. Perhaps more returns are gained per working hour here than at any other industry on the campus.

The type of work done at the College Press ranges from ordinary job printing to four color process work.





LAUNDRY

The laundry, under the direction of Mrs. C. A. Williams, employs only nine workers this year. Of these, six workers are college students and three, academy students. The laundry crew has been said to be the happiest group on the campus. And why shouldn't we be? We have a building all our own this year (the old puffery building); our job is not the hardest on the campus; we have good equipment; but best of all, our workers are all congenial, thus making a pleasant atmosphere, and we each try our best to please our patrons.
