Dear Ex-Creekers:

MESSAGE FROM PROF

A couple of years ago the alumni took as their project a steam and service tunnel to run from the boiler to the new cafeteria. In a previous letter I think I told how it went by the green houses, behind the boys' dormitory and church, then on to the swimming pool, then turned and followed the road to the old kitchen. It is a concrete passage way from two or three to eight feet underground. It's quite a walk to follow it all the way.

Anyway for about a year the tunnel was completed, but no steam line was in it. This summer Mr. Ed talked to Mr. Smallman (some of the boys took welding from him) and he agreed to help weld the pipe together. It is a $2\frac{1}{2}$ inch steel pipe up to the church, which has to be welded together. From there a 2 inch line was joined with regular threaded couplings. A new family have joined our staff, the Wencels, and he is an all-round handy man who helped Mr. Ed on the project.

At last, about a month ago, the last coupling was coupled and steam flows unhindered all the way from the boiler to the cafeteria. The pipe is well insulated, so the tunnel is very little warmer than the outside air.

This should be a real energy saver, as the old line leaked in several places, the insulation had fallen off or rotted away; and some places the pipe was lying in the mud at the bottom of the trench. You would have to walk through the tunnel to appreciate the effort involved in this project.

The other building connections have yet to be made. The green house, boys dorm, church and swimming pool are to be served by the line. We hope the swimming pool will once more be usable all winter.

I believe I have also mentioned the 50,000 gallon water tank on the very back of the Kirby property and the 4 and 6 inch plastic water lines that have to be brought in a ditch at least three feet deep all the way to the new San and on to the pump house at the spring. For several months the line lay dormant just through the cow lot fence behind the cafeteria, then moved on to the bowl. Just a few weeks ago Mr. Ed moved in with the back hoe and started a trench up through the woods under water and telepholines. We followed with the pipe; and presto, the pipes are now in the new sanitarium back yard.

We found one large rock in the ditch. Mr. Ed and I and a couple of boys beat on it with a hammer for about half a day and removed part, but the last and lowest section seemed too much. Del Dimick looked at it and suggested another procedure. We have a propane flame thrower for burning weeds. He turned the flame on the rock for five or six minutes, then poured about a gallon of water on it. The rock would splinter and crack and part would break off rather easily. About five or six times with the process and the rock was out of the way. Mr. Del is good at solving problems like this.

Finally the roof is on the new San. No more working in the drips and puddles. A real mile stone and an expensive one--but it is on.

AVIATION AND RELATED AREAS

Last year was rather busy for the flying program. In September, a Cessna 152 was obtained. It has all the basic radios needed for complete Instrument training. It replaced a Cessna 150 that met with a slight misfortune. We sold the blue and white Cessna 150, 2775S, and combined two 150's into one 152. 75S was purchased by Chuck Ramsey, who is the punter-kicker for the New York Jets football team. He just about finished his private pilot's license before he had to go back to work this July.

Glen Van Arsdell set the most ambitious goal of any of the flying students this year. He did not turn 18 until the Sabbath of graduation, but within one week, he had passed his Commercial check ride, his Flight Instructor check ride, and his Instrument Instructor check ride. He finished his instrument rating a few months earlier, because he did not have to be 18 for it. Jon Larrabee stayed a week after graduation and finished his instrument rating. Dr. Van Arsdell also finished his Instrument rating early this summer. Albert Heidinger, from last year, finished his Commercial and Instrument rating before heading for Alaska to work. Glen is the second Flight Instructor to finish at Little Creek. Laury Weitzel, from last year, was the first.

Glen headed for Alaska in his Taylor craft the same day he took his last check ride. A Taylorcraft is from the late 1940's, and has no radios for navigation. He made the trip in about a week. He worked giving flight instruction, etc., while in Alaska. His family flew up a couple of weeks ago and picked him up. They arrived home on August 17.

On September 20 at 8:00 P.M., we are going to have a Saturday night program that features flying. Evelyn Johnson, from Morristown, is going to be with us and talk about her flying experiences. Many of you may remember taking a check ride from her at some time in your flying career. She has flown over 40,000 hours, and was awarded Flight Instructor of the Year this past year. We will also show a short movie on the EAA flyin at Oshkosh, Wisconsin. Several Little Creek pilots showed up for the excitement at Oshkosh this year, and those who missed it will want to come and see what went on up there.

COMPUTER FOR LITTLE CREEK

Some of you were aware of the fact that for the last ten or eleven years, we have been using a computer to process all of our accounting and related records. We shared one with some other organizations that were located in Chattanooga. Well, this summer we moved the entire computer system to Little Creek. It is an IBM System/32 and while a small computer, is quite adequate to handle the volume of work that we do. It really is more convenient to have it here, even though we still process some work for the company that was based in Chattanooga. This helps pay for it—we hope. If any of you need any custom computer work done, we might be able to do it and save you money.

A NEW TELESCOPE - David Patterson

Several years ago a PUC physics professor gave Little Creek a 9 3/4" parabolic telescope mirror. More recently someone donated some money to buy a first class tube, mount and clock drive for the telescope. The new mounting made it easier and more enjoyable to use the telescope. Nevertheless, it took 3 or 4 people to place the 8 foot telescope on its mount and some time to make the adjustments needed for viewing. Furthermore there was no way to move the mount indoors and prevent the elements from taking their toll. While considering ways to solve these problems it occurred to us that the new smaller telescopes were capable of producing views comparable to our big telescope and without all the problems. We were able to sell our larger telescope for nearly enough to buy a new 8 inch Celeston. (We bought the Celestron before the recent price increase and saved \$500 over the current list price.) It is light weight, easy to use and provides impressive views of the heavens. We will plan to have it available for use Alumni week-end. (We hope the weather will cooperate.)
