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
Southern Missionary College





During the past twelve months, fourteen that dates of SMC have gone out to do that bit in lands overseas. A complete bort will be in hand, we trust, by Homeling in October. Be sure to come to get

Among those leaving, we have the following departure notes which are of interest to all:

Chester and Mary Jean Damron, after Chester's graduation in 1957, spent a year obtaining a master's degree in theology at Washington, and since then has been doing district work at Lenoir City, Tennessee. He writes as follows:

I was ordained to the gospel ministry at camp meeting in June, 1960. My work in Bangkok, Thailand, will be first to pastor the Thai-English church there. I shall also be training young Thais to do evangelistic work. After we obtain a knowledge of the language, we will conduct evangelistic campaigns throughout Thailand. Mary Jean will be doing part-time medical secretarial work for the doctors in the hospital.

"SMC holds a warm place in our hearts. The 'missionary' spirit fills our hearts as we leave the homeland. The spirit of a school is built into the very boards of the floor and the students' desks, as well as in their hearts. This same spirit sends us forth to do God's work in Thailand.

"Pray for us as we sail and, with John, we say: 'Come quickly, Lord Jesus.'" From Dr. Louis G. Ludington '40, and

his wife, also a physician, who spent four years at home achieving a better preparation to serve the people of his adopted country, Thailand. He writes as follows:

We are happy to be back in Bangkok and associate again with the host of friends we have among the workers, students, and patients. Our responsibilities are considerably larger than during our first tour of duty, however. This institution has grown to around two hundred beds, with a nursing school of over two hundred and with a staff of workers numbering three hundred and forty. God is really blessing us, and we are happy in the work.

Since being graduated in 1940, Doctor Ludington has acquired the following titles: M.D., D.N.B., Certified American Board of Surgery. Both he and his wife have occupied residencies in California in attaining these added degrees. His present position is that of medical director of the Thai medical institutions. He was gracious enough to attribute to his college training developing within him the desire for high ideals and standards and a love for truth.

Paul M. Watson '50 and Ruth Risseter Watson '49 under the date of June 19, wrote:

I am completing my internship June 30, and in August plan to go to our sanitarium and hospital in Bangkok, Thailand, where I shall work as a physician in general practice for a term of five years. We have two children, Linda and Jimmy." John F. Harris '55 and Patricia Thames-

Harris '53, in July wrote from Los Angeles, California, as follows:

'We spent the past year at the seminary at Washington — a year we count as a high point in our lives. Pat took a class in prophetic guidance, and accompanied me on the tour of historical significance to the Advent movement in 1959, directed by D. A. Delafield. I majored in Bible and systematic theology with Dr. Edward Heppenstall. My minor was applied theology. I was graduated June 2 with an M.A

"While at the seminary we received a call to Thailand to serve as pastor-evangelist on the island of Bhuket, off the coast, 500 miles to the southwest of Bangkok. There are few members there, no church building, but a small clinic headed by an



American doctor. We hope and pray that we shall have a nice church there before long. The people are largely Buddhists, and we count it a great privilege and challenge to take the message we love so much to those who know nothing of

Christ. "I believe my decision to go to the mission field was a gradual one, to which various institutions contributed. Many have referred to our answering this call as a sacrifice. Perhaps, to some extent, it is, and yet, in some ways, I feel that we don't know what sacrifice is. If our going can hasten our Lord's coming, any hardship we may have to face will soon be forgotten. Pray for us as we go, and we shall do the same for you as you 'stay by the stuff.'"

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An Outstanding Occasion

From the opening meeting of the 1960 Alumni Homecoming on Friday evening, October 14, until the final scene of the pageant, "Through the Years with SMC," everyone present seemed to enjoy himself thoroughly. Over one hundred from points outside the Collegedale area were present, from as far east as South Lancaster, Massachusetts; as far north as Bangor, Michigan; as far west as Vincennes, Indiana; and as far south as Maitland, Flordia.

The very first meeting was powerpacked with a vibrant appeal to rise to the call of the hour. The speaker, Kenneth E. Mensing, class of 1950, presented the alumni present in the tabernacle a challenge. This meeting was made more memorable with the presentation by the treasurer, Donald L. West, '49, of twenty sons and daughters of alma mater who had either already gone overseas since last October or will go before year's end. They include alumni from as far back as the class of 1921, Rose Meister, who is responding to a call to serve as a teacher of the children of the missionaries of our center at Bangkok, Thailand, to Leslie Pendleton, class of 1959, who, with Shirley, his wife, will leave immediately for Nairobi, Kenya, Mission, South Africa. The names of the twelve already serving overseas of this group were inscribed in the Book of Missions before a large audience. Among others taking part in this program were J. Don Crook, '53, Drew Turlington, 51, Anne Davidson Pettey, '59, and Rachel Atkins, '57.

The Sabbath dawned bright and clear. Soon the alumni again gathered at the Tabernacle for the study of the touching Sabbath school lesson on Christ, the Redeemer. Present to make us happier was that prince of vocalists, Wayne Thurber, '48. The mission story by George Gott, recently returned from a six-year period of service in Lebanon, Middle Eastern Division, will not soon be forgotten. Ted Graves, '54, led the singing; Clifford Bee, '29, presented us to God in prayer. The Sabbath school was conducted by alumnus William J. Hulsey, '55.

The eleven o'clock hour was the high point of the week end. The platform manager for this occasion was the executive secretary, H. B. Lundquist, who after this homecoming is responding to a call to serve as pastor of the Ashland, Kentucky, church. The order of the service was carried out by the beloved pastor of our Collegedale church, Roy B. Thurmon. The speaker for the occasion, none other than our ex-student, Pastor Robert H. Pierson, president of the Southern African Division, was introduced by the president of the college, Doctor C. N. Rees. The invocation was given by John Bottsford, Jr., the offertory prayer by Dr. Chalmer Chastain, '44, and the benediction by Lewis A. Wynn, '53. J. Mabel Wood, the faithful secretary of the Association, presided at the organ.

Pastor Pierson spoke from the text found in Romans 9:28. In forceful language, he pointed out that for these last moments of probationary time, our task is to hasten the return of the Lord Jesus. He told of having bade good-bye to a group of our believers on the Arajuna River in British Guiana while all sang "There will be joy when the work is done," in three different languages, and then of visiting with some of our great pioneers in Takoma Park. The same hope buoyed them in their declining days-the finishing of God's work in this generation. He said the greatest need of all is to have the work finished in one's own heart.

He told us of the tremendous strides the work was making in South Africa, where we now have 170,000 baptized members, and some 300,000 Sabbath school members. He also told of the unvarying fidelity of our believers in the Congo even when our white workers had to flee before the fury of exploding nationalism.

In the afternoon, a program of sacred music under the auspices of the Music Department was given, featuring among others alumni Leland Tetz, '60, Anne Davidson Pettey, '59, Don L. West, '49, and J. Don Crook, '53. As a fitting finale of this very beautiful program, Elder Pierson continued to thrill all present with his stories of the mission advance in the Critical Continent, Africa. Our day of opportunity is not over but, if we are to reap the maximum fruit, we must hasten, Elder Pierson told us.

Just after sundown, the alumni gathered in the spacious cafeteria where they were served a light supper by the college. A new project was enthusiastically voted by the Association, the campaign for 1960-61 to be entitled, "The One Hundred Club." Among the various objects suggested, one will be chosen soon, and announced by the executive committee. One thousand sixty-seven (\$1,067) dollars was pledged by twenty-three alumni present, an average of fortysix (\$46) each. A report of the operation of the Student Loan Fund will be found in another column.

The election of officers for the ensuing fiscal year was held, and resulted in the election of the following for 1960-61: President—William J. Hulsey, 55; Vice-President—J. Don Crook, '53; Secretary—Inelda Phillips Hefferlin, '58; Assistant Secretary—Bobra Morgan Barrington, '50; Treasurer— Warren G. Hammond, '51.

The closing feature of the program, as mentioned at the beginning, was a gripping pageant on the early history of the alma mater, featuring such pioneers as G. W. Colcord, the first principal; S. E. Wight, president of the Southern Union; and W. H. Branson, president of the Southeastern Union; Maude Jones, George Fuller, John Cole, Jake Conger, Ruby Lea, and C. E. Ledford. Surely all great enterprises have small and very humble beginnings. After this pageant, it is certain that no one present will ever have any doubt that only God could have guided our alma mater to her present state considering the way this institution began its career.

J. Don Crook, the likable retiring president, sent everybody away with the heartiest wishes for health and happiness until we shall meet again next October. May God grant it!
