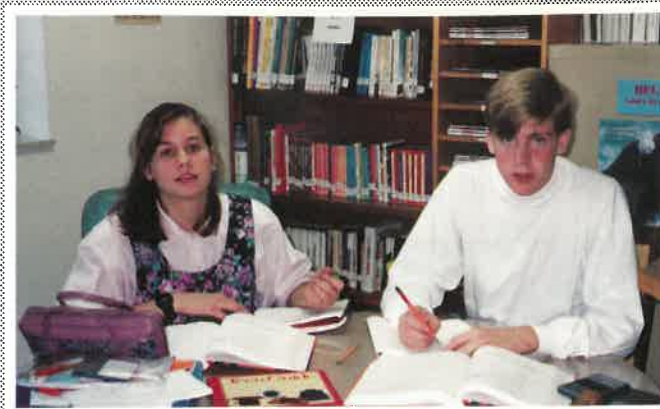

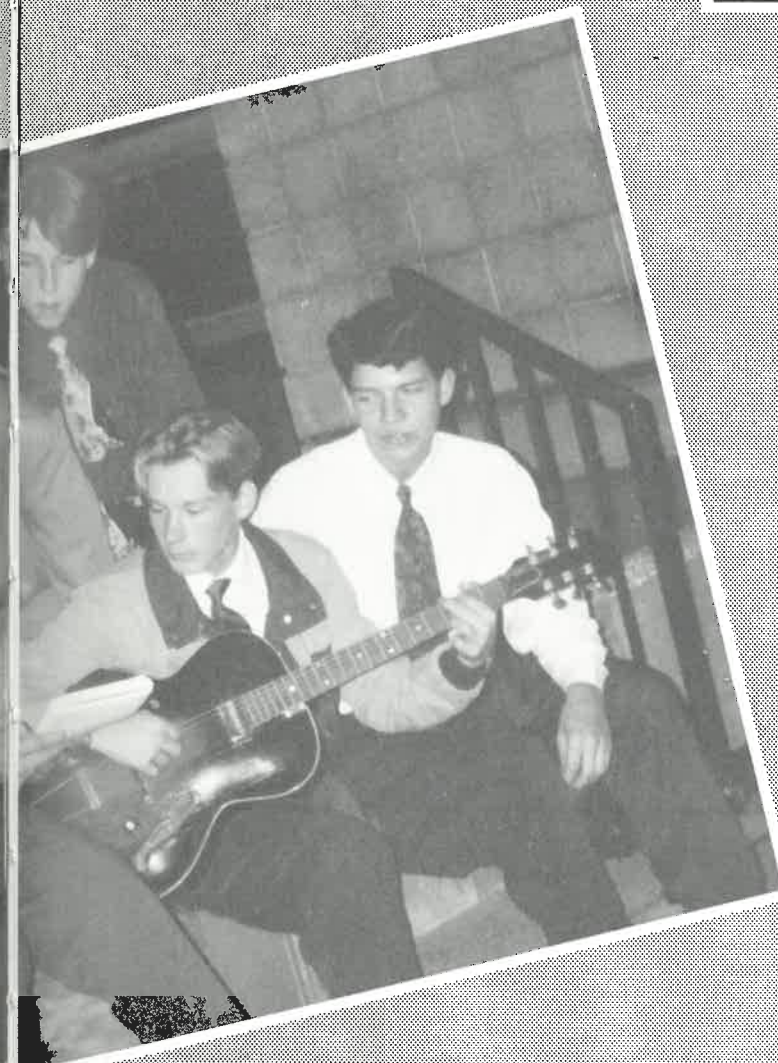
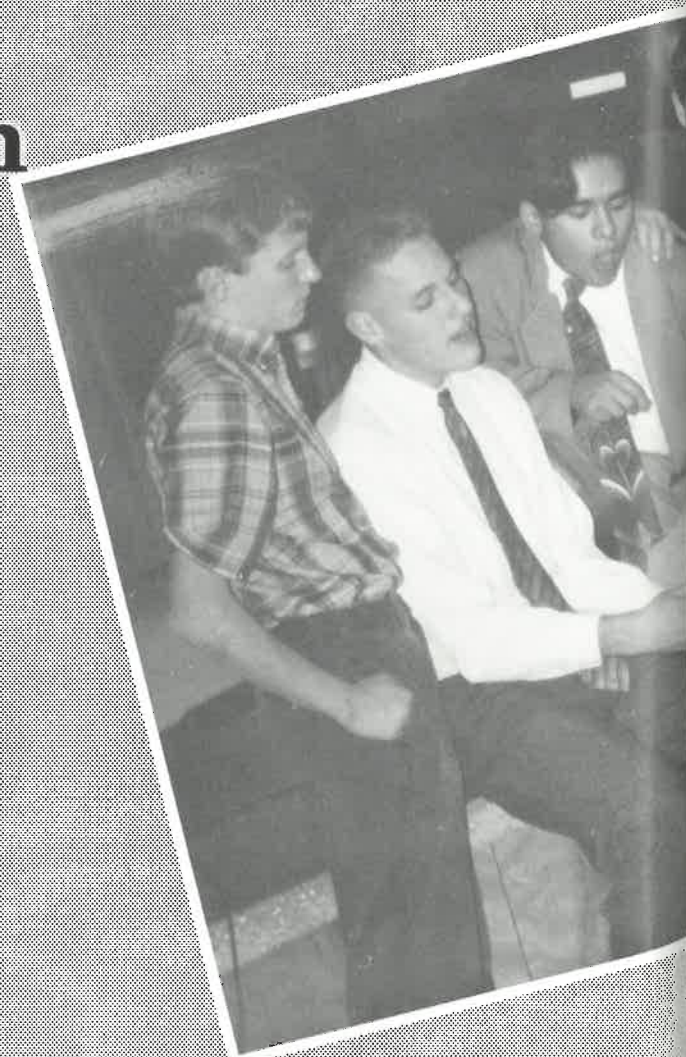

Though it ended too soon, we at least returned with renewed strength to meet the full schedule we faced when we returned.



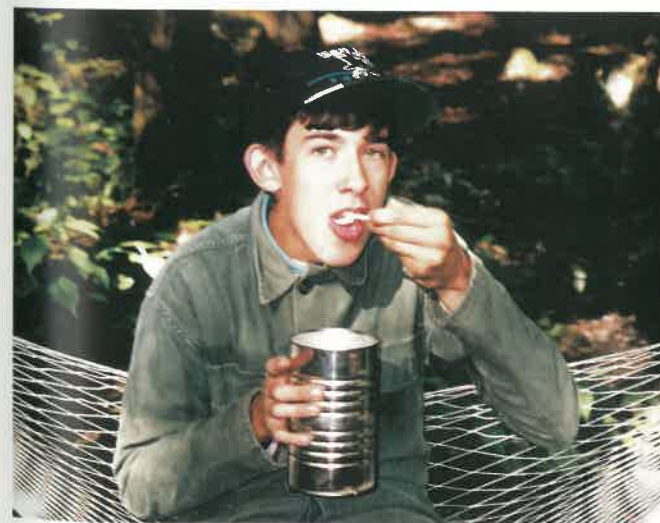

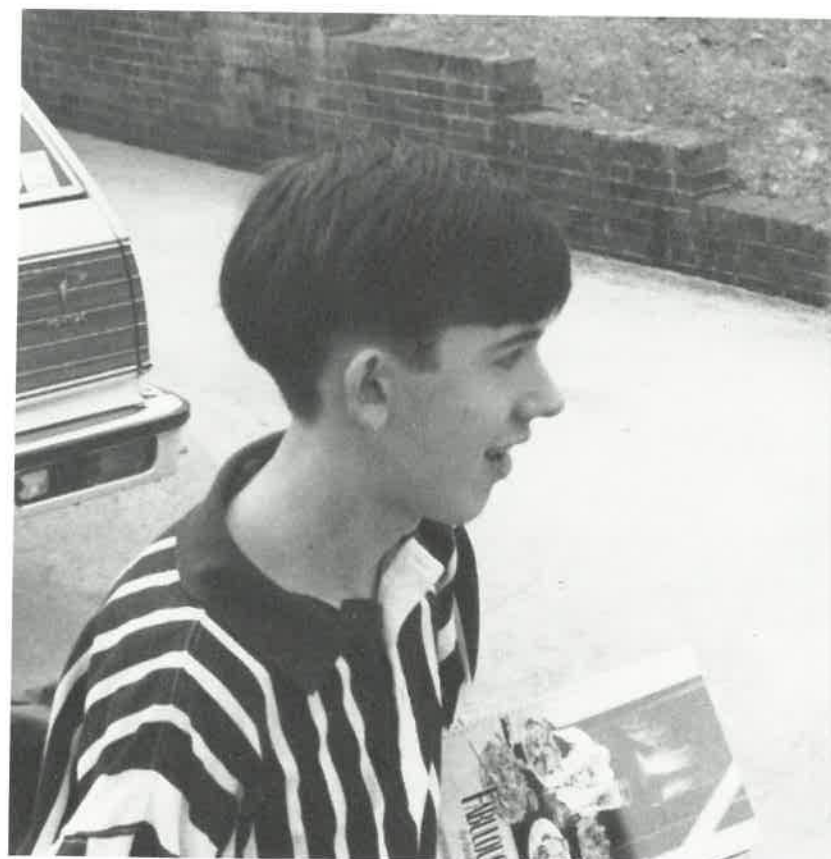

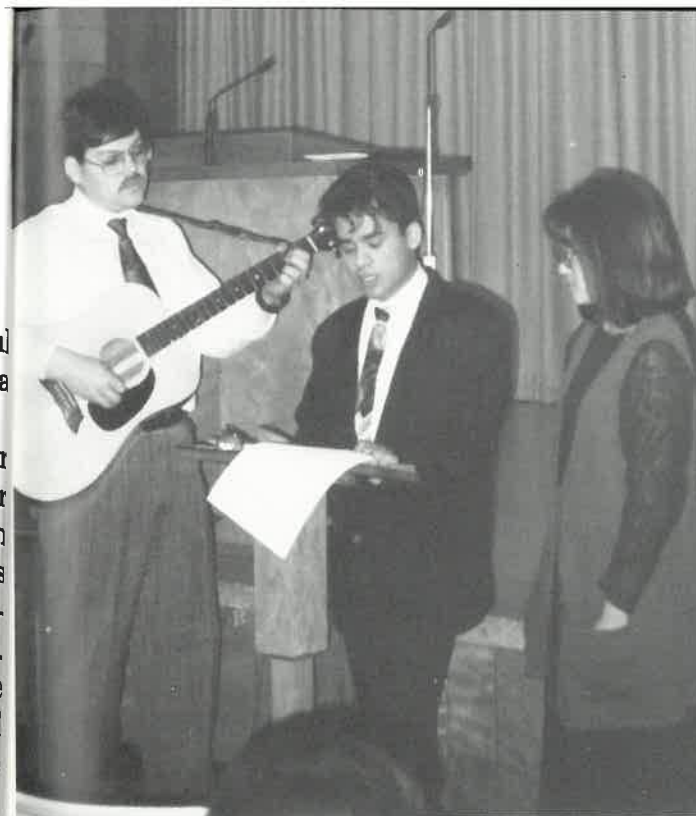
in the dorms and wonderful things are happening as a result.

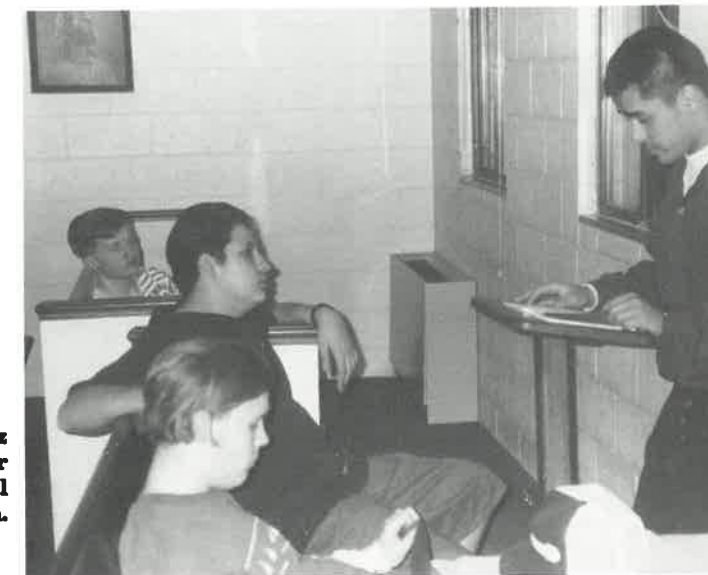

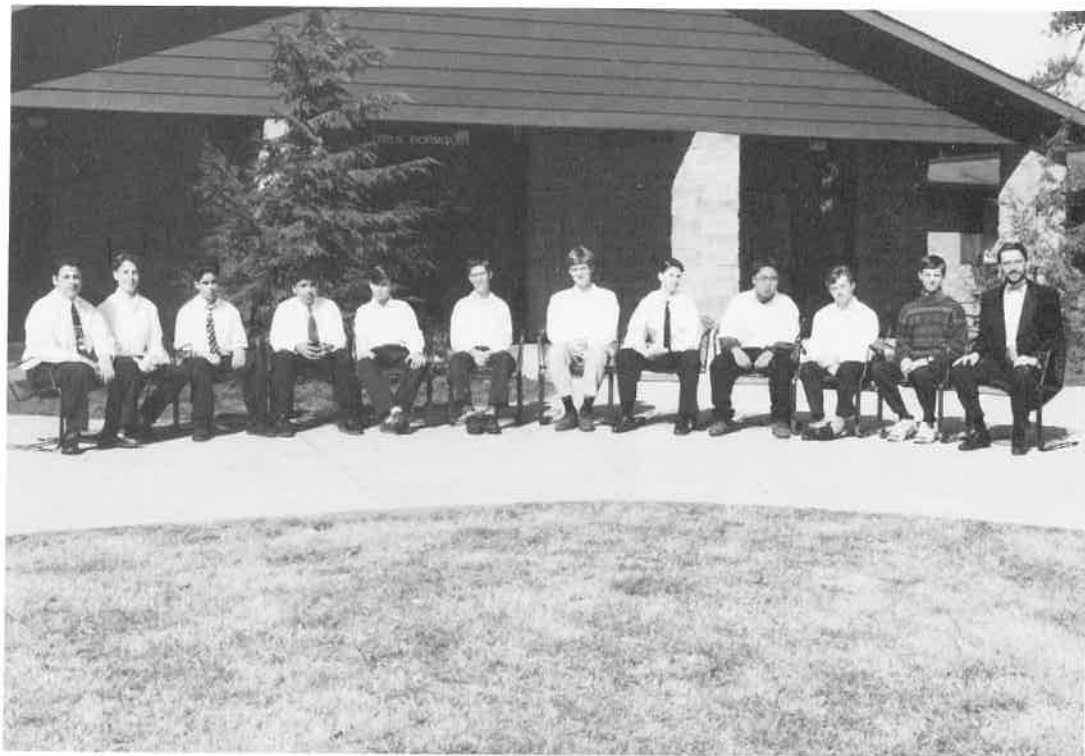

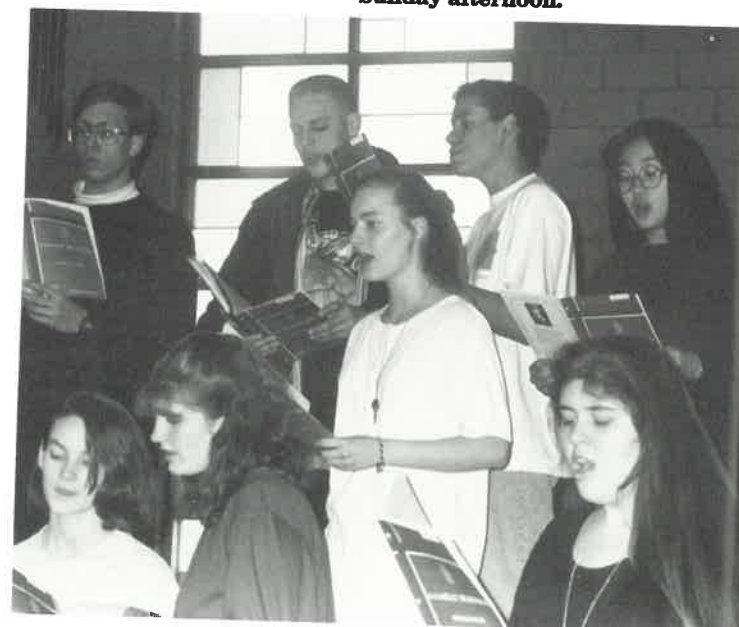

experience. When the studyhall curfew is passed and someone is found outside their room, the dead cockroach, and the tree hugs have been given as reminders to abstain from such actions in the future.

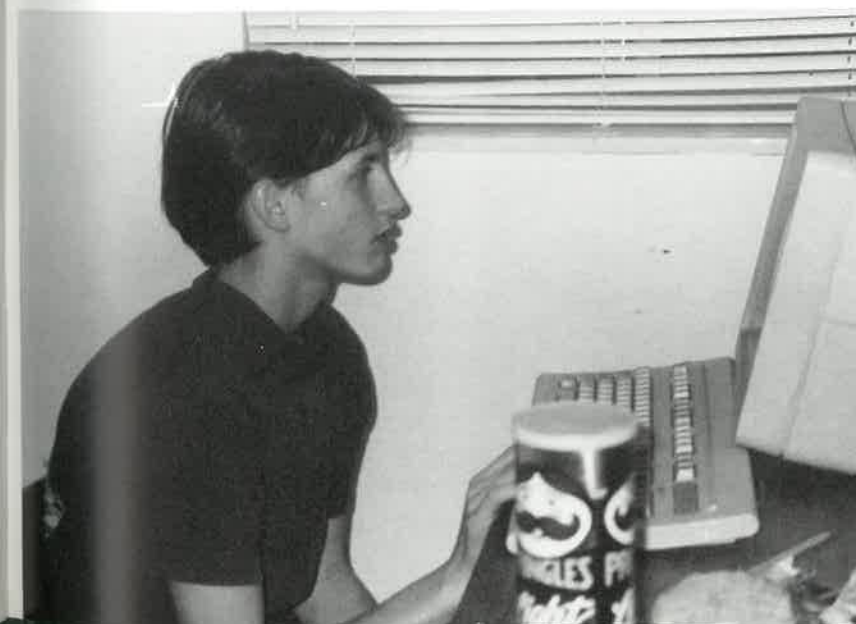
Even though it's obvious that "When you're living there together, you become a lot closer,"

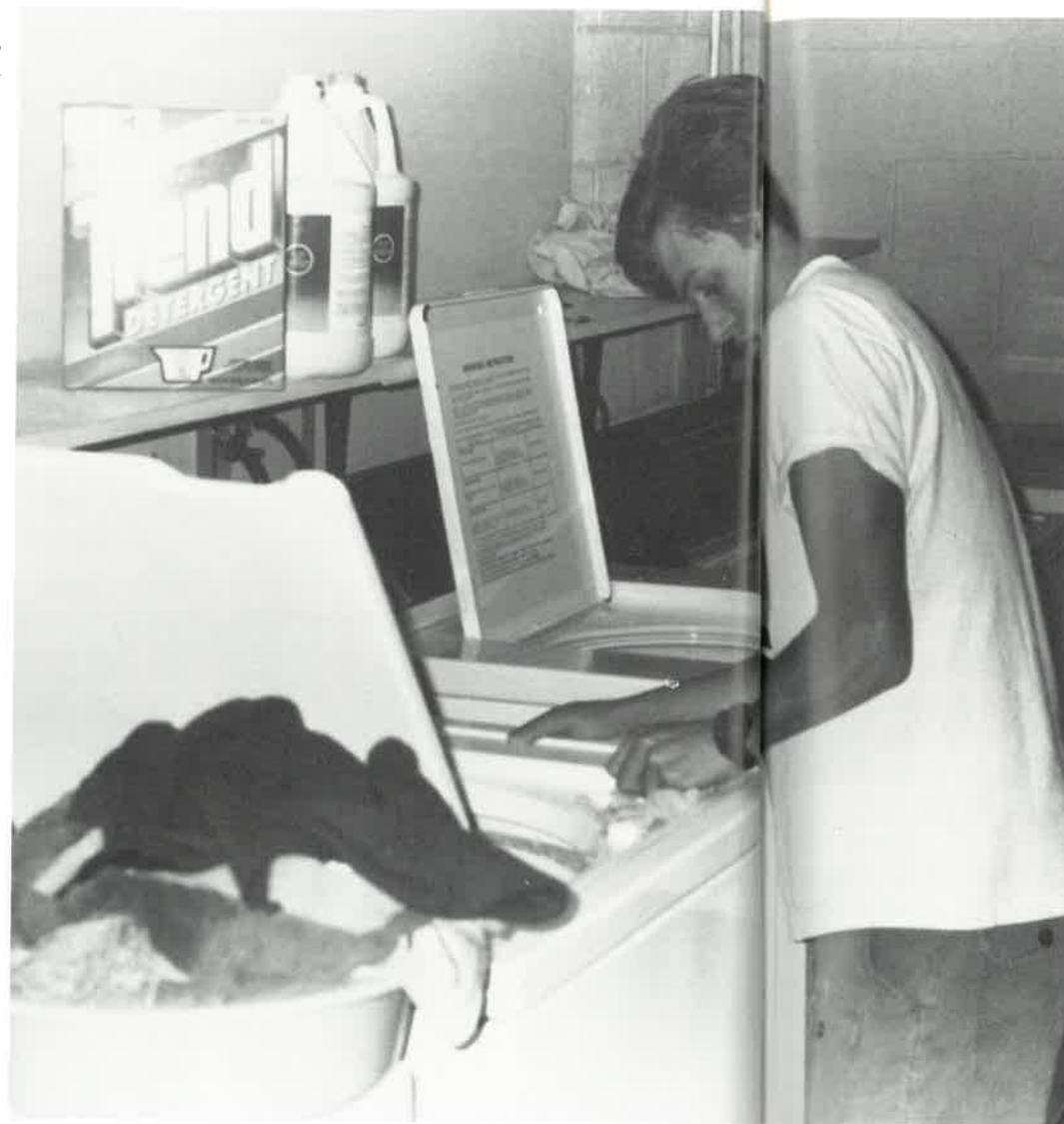

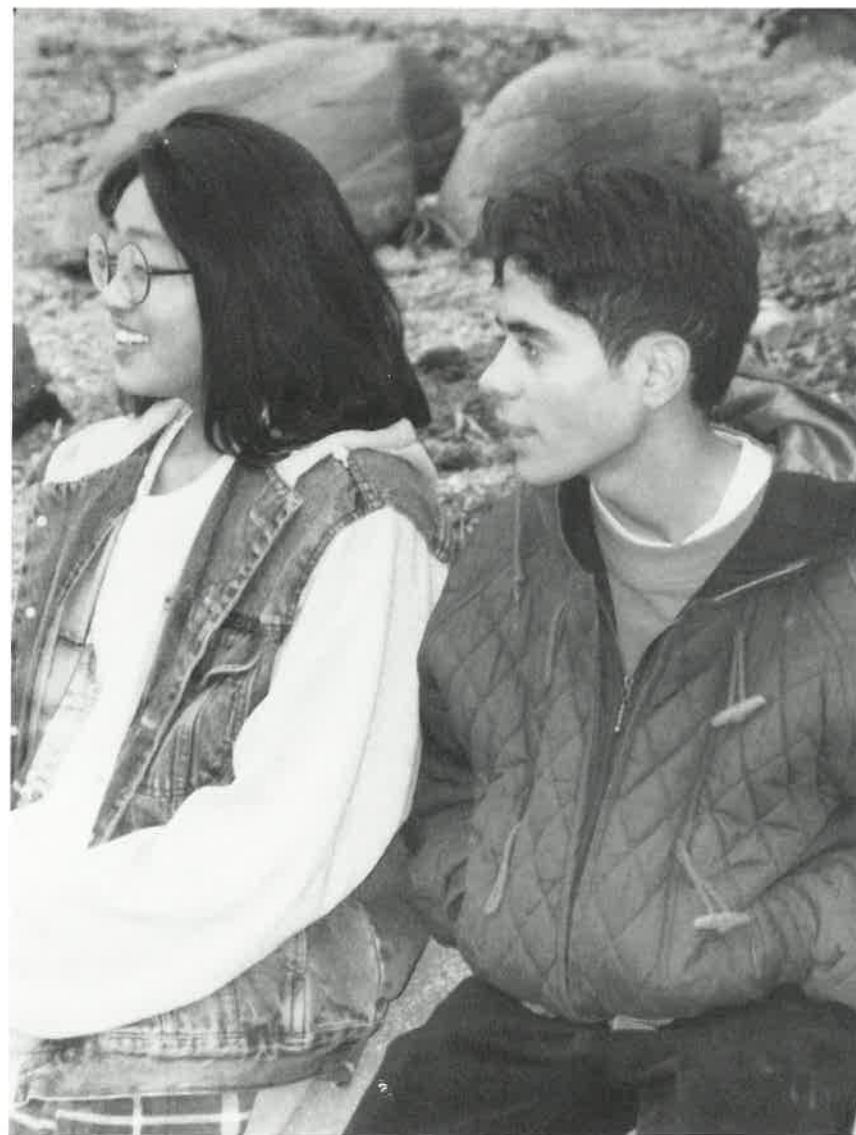
# Play Ball!!!!

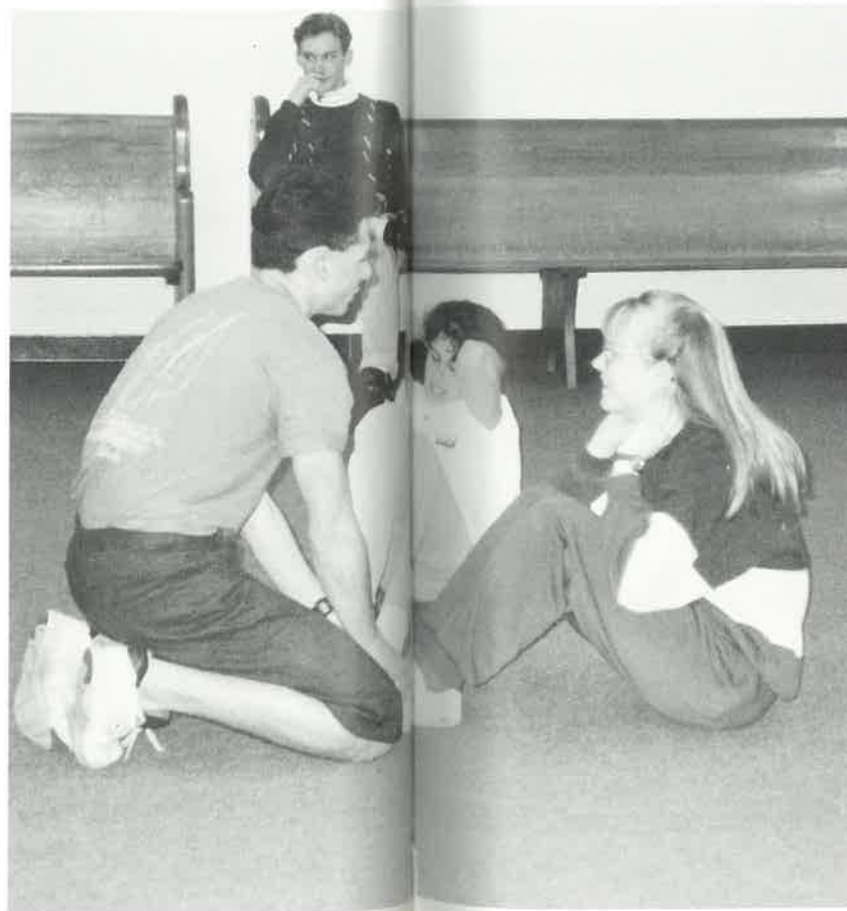

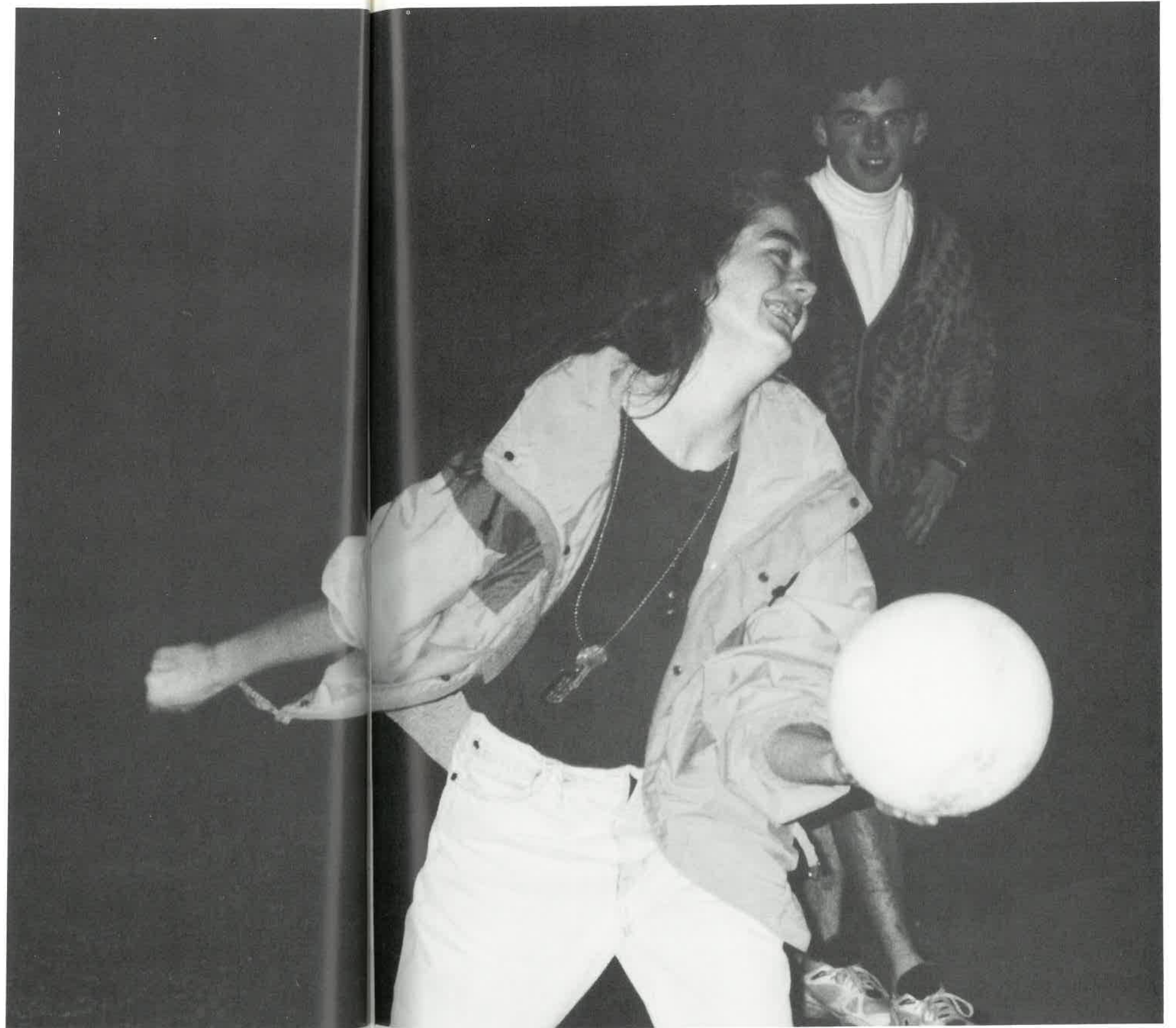

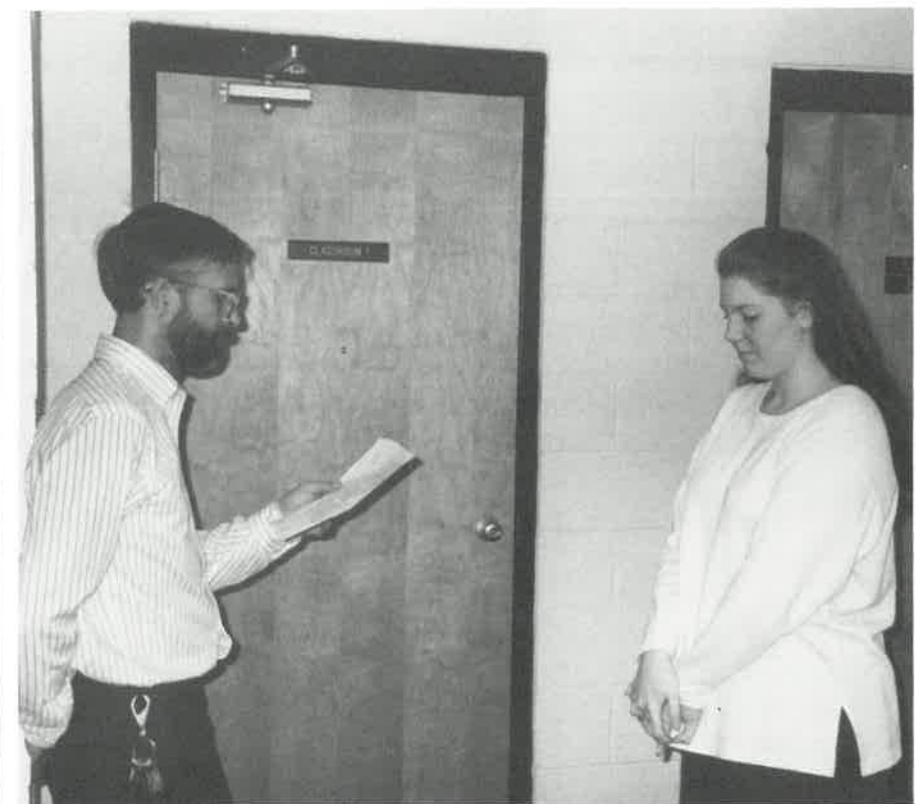

help with is washing dishes. Even the garden crew gets drafted into helping with the lunch dishes.

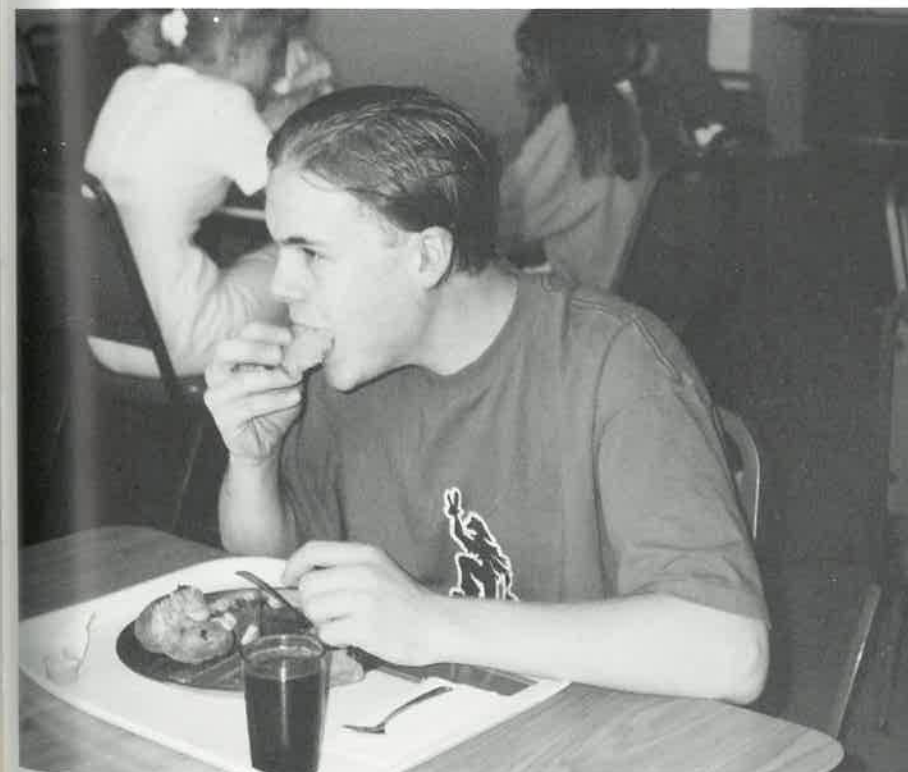

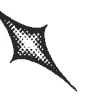

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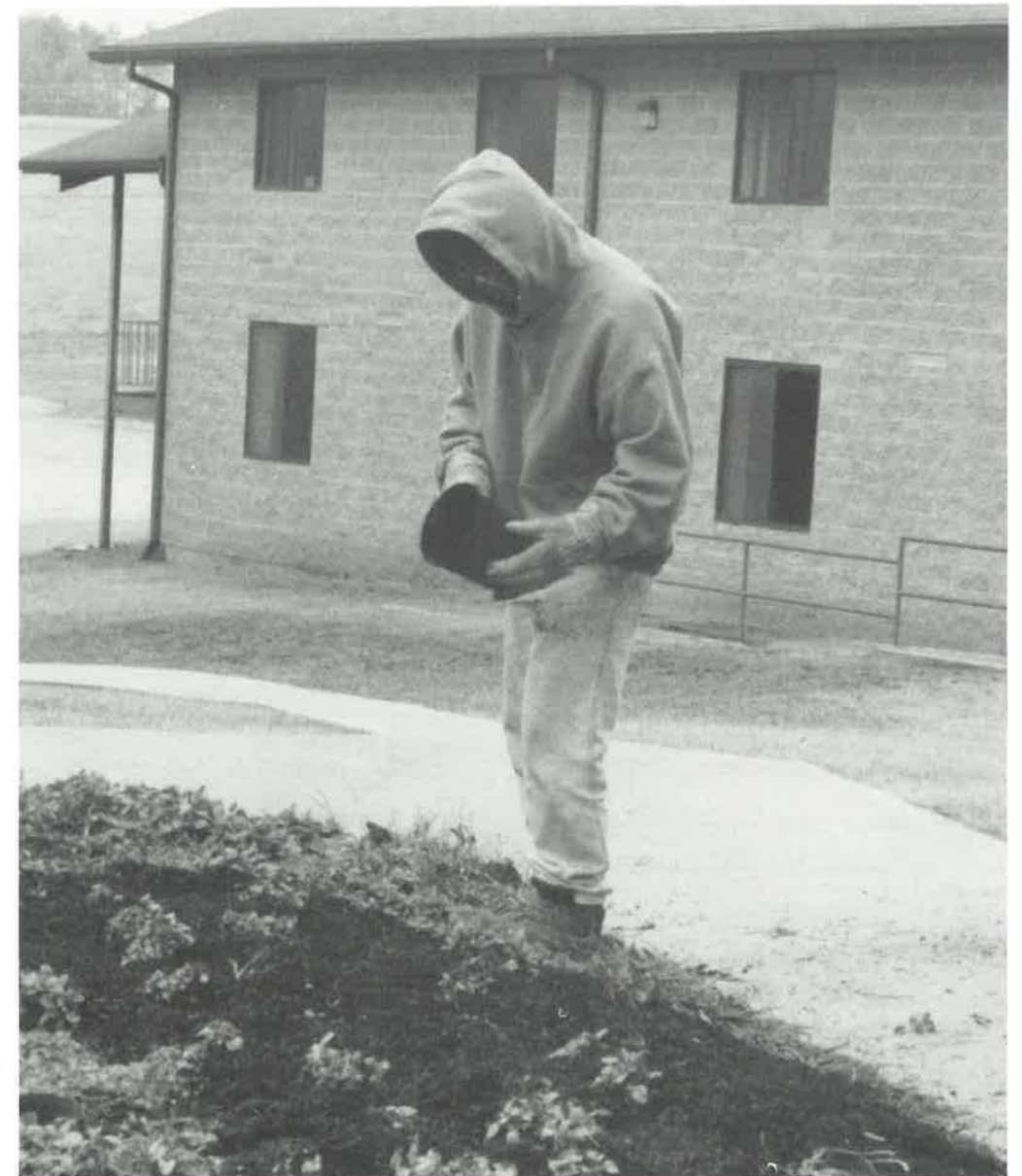

"The best part of the whole day is the thrill of getting all greasy and dirty while trying to fix one of the cars. At least, that is what I like the most." Jason Gaunt said.

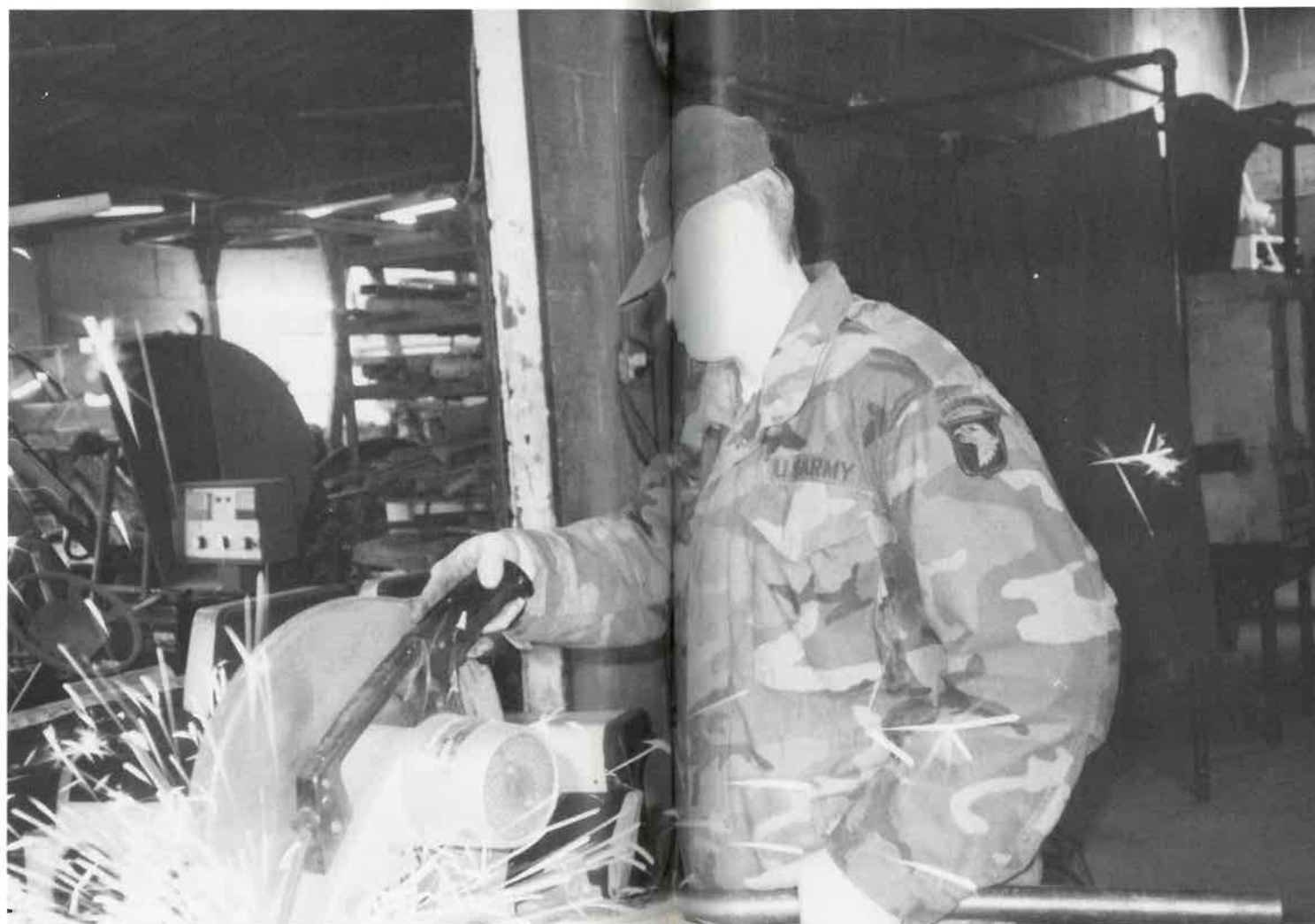

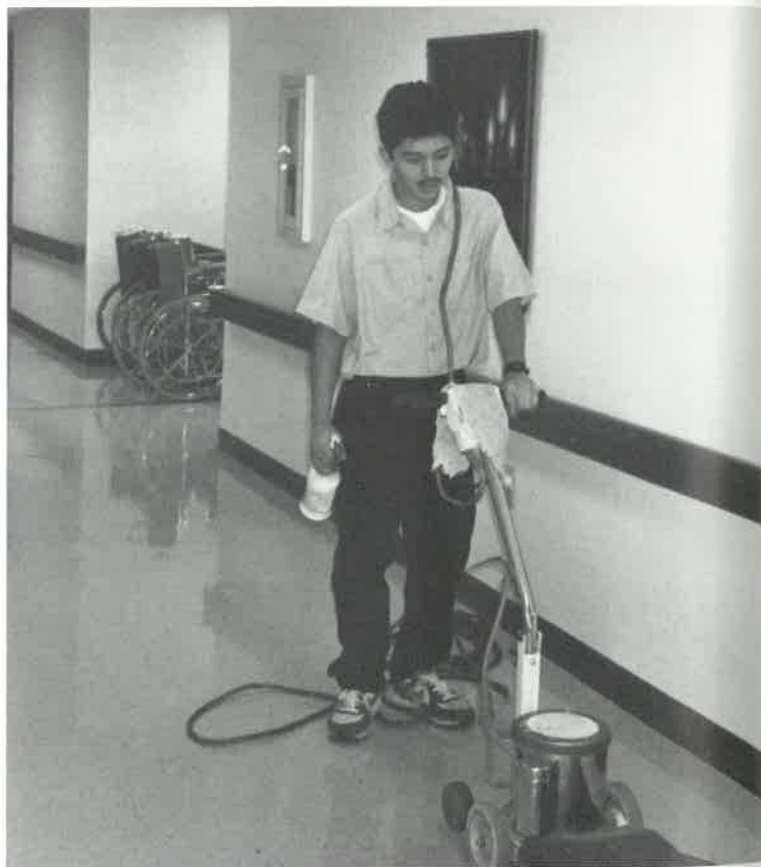

Being a part of the scene of action and fast pace, you, as a worker, must become acquainted with the three words **look, listen, and learn.**

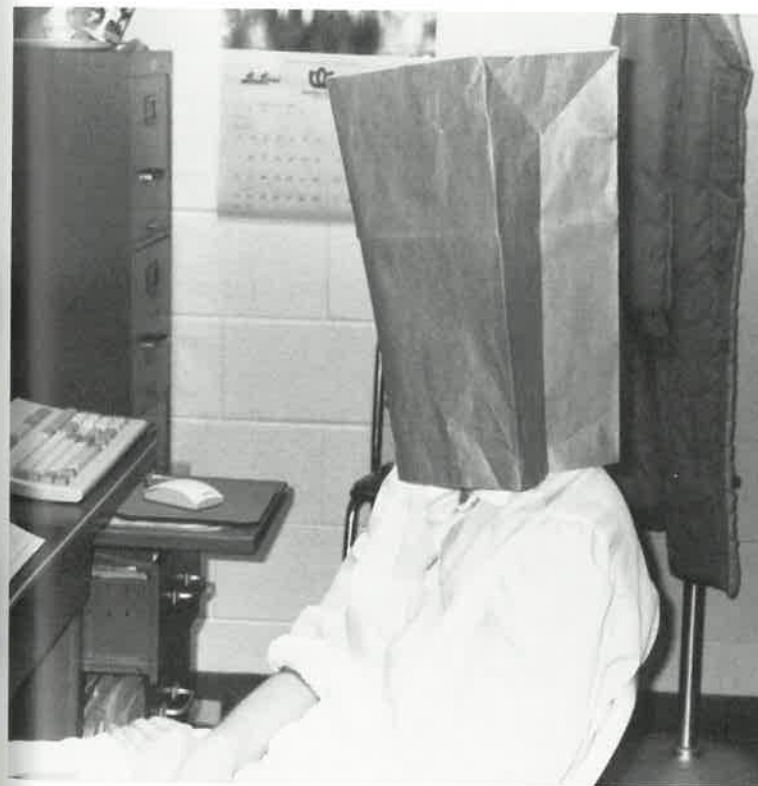
The supervisors are quick to give you something to do if they see you walking around. Don't ever let them catch you doing nothing. So it is important to learn to **look** around

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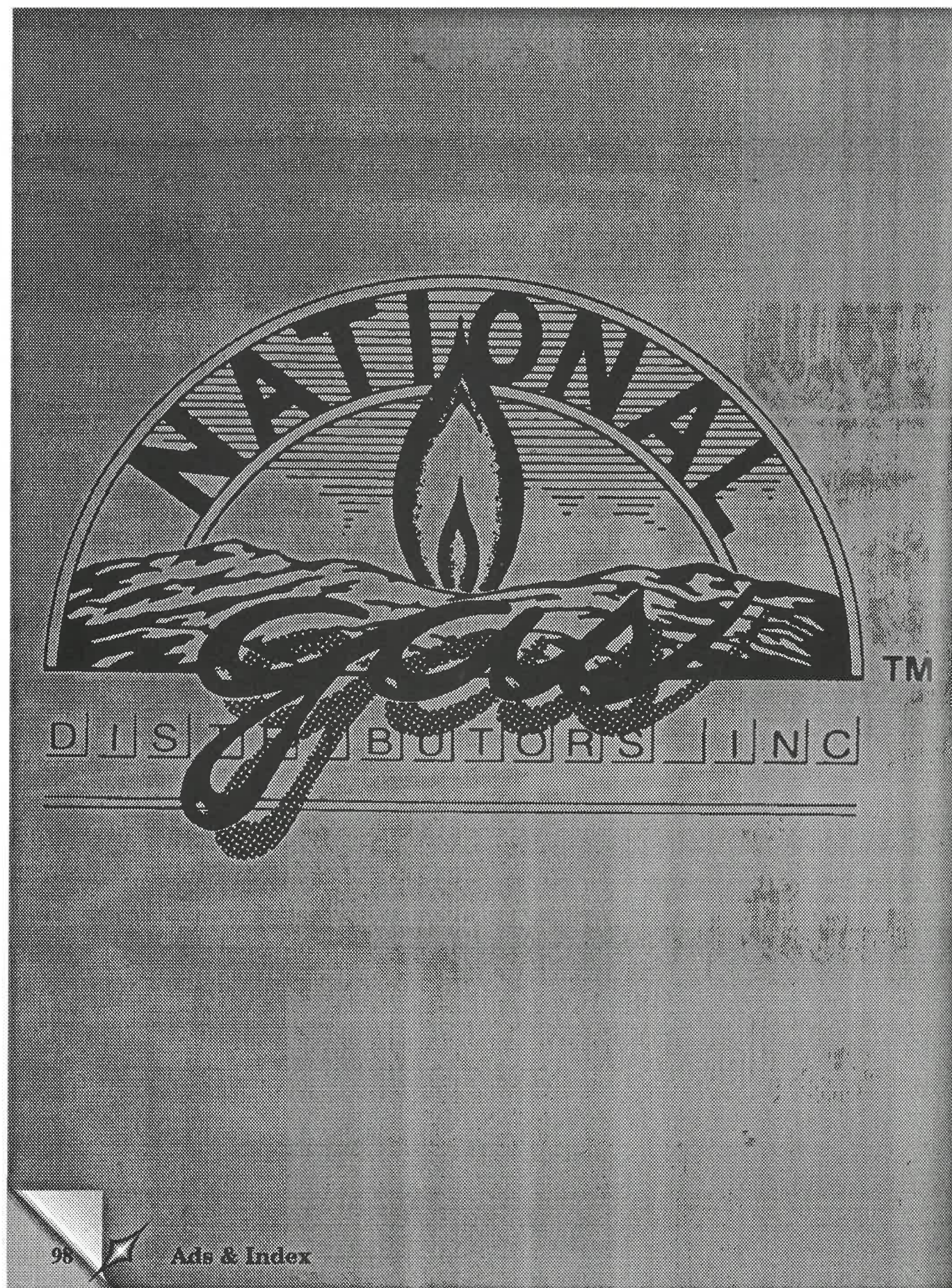
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# The Impossible
