On Friday all the washers, dryers and office equipment had to be moved. But by Sabbath all the essentials were in place. Many thank-yous to all on campus and off who worked so hard to help us.

Through the Coolidge's interest, support and encouragement, this much needed facility was added to the campus in 1964 and has been an untold blessing through the years.

The eleven o'clock service included a few remarks from Alice Straw relating the many improvisions used in preparation for graduation prior to 1964, such as using public school auditoriums, under parachutes in the bowl and even in the shop. Then each adult member of the Coolidge family expressed their recollections pertaining to Alta and LeRoy Coolidge and to their school years. Bill Coolidge gave the sermonette. The service was concluded by the great-grand children, Cindy and Billy, unveiling the plaque.

NEWS FROM THE FLYING DEPARTMENT--Kenneth Straw

The past year has been a busy one for the flight department. The Private Pilot Certificate was earned by three of our students--Brent Van Arsdell, Dale Tunnell, and Jan Malmede. Chuck Ramsey, a New York Jets football player who bought our old Cessna 150, also finished his Private Certificate last year.

Lonny Weitzel obtained several advanced ratings during the year. He has a couple of "Firsts" in our aviation program. He is the first student to make 100% on an FAA Written Test, and the first to become a Flight Instructor before graduation. During the year, he passed his Instrument Rating, Commercial Pilot Certificate, and Flight Instructor Airplane Certificate.

Laury Weitzel, who graduated two years ago, obtained the use of an old Cessna 310 that we could use for just putting in the gas. So, at the beginning of the summer, Kenneth Straw and Laury Weitzel added Multi-Engine ratings to their flight instructor certificates. Laury also added the Instrument instructor rating to his flight instructor last year. At the end of the summer, Albert Heidinger, who graduated two years ago, completed his Flight Instructor Certificate.

With all of this activity, it seems there isn't much left for the future that is exciting. Well, Kenneth Straw is working towards the Airline Transport Pilot certificate.
