A sorrowful phone call from Paul Burdick (son-in-law) told us of the sudden death of Mr. Kelly October 1, 1985. Little Creek was born in 1940. There was only a farm house and barn--I'm sure when, but sometime in the late forties the Kellys came and lived in hutments broug from Oak Ridge. We had very little to offer anyone, but they improved our food service and heating systems. He installed our first boiler plus many other improvements.

Then in 1975 Mr. Kelly came to install the drapes in the new cafeteria. I walked in to see how the drapes looked and he said "Alice, do you know what I think of when I see you?"
"No, what?" I said.

"You've come a long way, baby!" It was especially funny because it was so out of character for him.

Roger, Gency, Leland and I drove to Collegedale to visit with the family. Though it was sad they were thankful for his many useful years and that he went peacefully, without losing his dignity as so many do.

The funeral service was at 11:00 a.m., October 4 and was conducted by Pastors Gordon Beitz and Don Aalborg. Burial was in Onaway, Michigan.
