ERC Reports 26,431 Baptisms

Every summer the ______ (ERC) takes large groups of students to multiple countries and hosts evangelistic series. Edgar Alquinta, Evangelistic Resource Center coordinator, begins his planning shortly after the trips so he can begin inviting students to participate as soon as the fall semester begins.

Both for students and accompanying staff members, it is a great opportunity to share the Gospel in this way. Alquinta was able to partake in three ERC trips as a student and has participated in others on his own even before recently beginning employment at Southern. The percentage of pastor's that have gone on trips such as these is slim, and it's a great opportunity for the students headed towards a religious career.

"They can come into churches and motivate the congregation toward evangelism," Alquinta said.



As of the summer of 2014, the ERC has sent 917 speakers and as a result, has reported 26,431 baptisms!

Since the ERC began, 917 speakers have gone out and played a direct role in 26,431 baptisms! This year, Alquinta and his team have made evangelistic plans with four groups of students in three countries: Mexico, Columbia, and Brazil. Students must meet their fundraising needs by the end of January because training begins in February.

"The ERC's main goal is to make a contribution to not only worldwide churches through evangelism, but to have the students bring that enthusiasm home and want to make a difference for the local churches here."

Nonprofit Helps Single Mothers with Tuition
