## Mission Station Underway



This family and home are typical of the families and homes where SMC students and faculty members are working this summer. Those participating are as follows: Judy Bentzinger, Milford Crist, John Durichek, Mrs. Genevieve McCormick, Don Pate, Christine Pulido, Gladstone Simmons, David E. Smith and Raymond Wagner.

Since alumni, at Homecoming time last October, donated \$3000 to the SMC student missionary project, it was felt that a report of the progress of the project would be of interest to alumni.

The "Nicaraguan Nine," as they are affectionately called, arrived at their destination, Puerto Cabezas, after traveling 13 days, four nights, and nearly 4000 miles, arriving on the date they had planned.

The Nicaraguan Mission Project is being jointly sponsored by the SMC Missionary Volunteer Society and the Student Association. This is the first year since SMC's student missionary program began in 1967 that faculty members have actually gone with the students to a foreign country. It is also the first time that all students have gone to the same place.

The goal of the three-year project is to build a new mission station in the jungle about 50 miles from Puerto Cabezas, which is on Nicaragua's eastern coast. The area has a tropical rainy climate, the wettest in Central America. It is a region of swamps and low plains that are drained toward the Caribbean Sea by three rivers.

The SMC class of 1971 contributed \$1000 as their class gift toward the purchase of a one-and-a-half ton truck with two seats, and a jeep which John Durichek, assistant professor of industrial arts at SMC, "recycled" for the trip.

Since their arrival at Colegio Adventista at Puerto Cabezas, they have not been idle. Milford Crist, '71, reports that the whole group has been busy helping around the school and taking part in the evangelistic meetings. Don Pate has started a P.E. program and is trying to organize a choir. They are preparing their equipment for the time when they move out to the "bush."

### Campus Grows

The campus landscape continues to change as the former cafeteria-home economics building comes down; the cafeteria sets up temporary quarters in the tabernacle; the new home economics building nears completion; and the new College Market readies for opening soon.

Demolition of the cafeteria-home economics building began immediately after the May commencement and will be completed shortly. All salvageable materials were removed for use elsewhere.

A new cafeteria-student center will be constructed during the next year on the site.

The SMC Cafeteria Bakery is moved already to its new site in the new College Market.

The "Tabeteria," so named by Mr. Luce, director of food services, is now

located in the old auditorium (Tabernacle). Contrary to expected reaction, he says the students tell him they like it better; his employees like it better; and he likes it better than the former location.

Students will find a new look in the dining area when they return. The Tab has been paneled, neon lighting installed and also "no drip" air conditioning. One gets the feeling of being at summer camp.

The building will seat 260-265 at one time, nearly as many (275) as the other building. The only disadvantage is that students have to walk a little farther.

Workmen are pushing hard to finish the new home economics building by the time classes start August 30.

The two-story modern structure will cost approximately \$350,000, including furnishings and equipment.

The interior decor was designed by Ellen Zollinger, '69, for which she was given an award by the Georgia Chapter of the American Institute of Interior Design.

The new \$350,000 Village Market, to open in September next to the post office, will be nearly two and one-half times the size of the present College Market. It has ten wide aisles compared to four narrow aisles in the old building. It will include a delicatessen, health and natural foods section, and sales outlet for the bakery.
