Mission Station Gets Help

Donald J. Pate, '73, seventh grade teacher at Madison, Tennessee, elementary school, who was a missionary to SMC's Nicaragua project, got the seventh and eighth graders at Madison interested in the Nicaragua Mission. They collected used books and clothing to send down to the school in Puerto Cabezas, about 75 miles from the location of the SMC project. The school has around 300 students including those who attend night classes. It is practically self-supporting and is one of the needlest in Central America. Most of the students are from non-Adventist homes and are of mixed races—Indian, Spanish and Negro. The Madison students collected 25 boxes each of books and clothing for them.

Richard E. Pomeroy, '73, and his wife, Meredith, left the early part of February for Francia Sirpi, the headquarters for the SMC project, with the books and clothing, in a Dodge 16' van with a GMC V-8 engine which has been completely overhauled. They also took a 12 kilowatt generator worth over \$3,000 wholesale and used only about 52 hours. This was donated by Mr. and Mrs. Ellsworth McKee. This generator will furnish electricity for the clinic, the house and other public buildings and still have some to spare. The generator is quite necessary for the clinic.

The mission also needed another jeep and when Dr. Richard Chandler, an Orlando dentist, learned of their need, he found a jeep with 21,000 miles on it and then he wrote to friends and colleagues asking for money to pay for it. The money was forthcoming and the jeep purchased. The jeep was attached to the Dodge van as a trailer for the trip. They also took examining tables and other equipment for the clinic.

Names of those students who would like to work at the mission station this summer have been received and selections will be made shortly.

Enrollment Sets New Record

Second semester registration at Southern Missionary College remains at a record high with 1,488 students, according to Dr. Arno Kutzner, director of admissions and records.

First semester brought the total to 1,555 students. With transfers and a few who have dropped for this semester, the enrollment is less, but the dormitories remain full.

Of the total, 294 are seniors, 314 juniors, 311 sophomores and 427 freshmen. The remainder of the students are special curricula or extension students.

The field of endeavor having the highest number is nursing with 421 enrolled. Both elementary and secondary education list 224, theology and religion

McKee Baking Co. Has New Product

Pro Kee is the name of a new protein product being made by the McKee Baking Company in Collegedale. An extruder machine is used in making the preparation which has a soy bean base and is dehydrated. It will take up three times its weight in water but they recommend only 60%.

Pro Kee is now sold through Collegedale Distributors and also distributors located in Keene, Texas.

The Village Market Bakery is making Pro Kee into a frozen vegetarian meat loaf and patties and selling them in the Village Market. They are also putting the product into loaves of bread.

Several similar products are in the experimental stage at present.

Dr. Oliver Miller, who is in charge of the development, has a doctorate from Texas A and M in food technology.

SMC Offers Terminal Courses

Since people are coming more and more to recognize that a college degree in most cases should prepare one for some means of making a living, colleges have taken a second look at their curricular offerings.

For those students who do not choose a four-year course, SMC is offering two-year terminal courses. In the 1972-73 school year an associate degree in construction technology was offered for the first time. This course flourished. Last year students built one large house which was sold at a good profit and this year they are building three large houses in the same area.

Next year a general technology course will be offered which will prepare one for general maintenance work around one of our academies or hospitals.

A two-year course in music with emphasis on applied music and not so much on theory, will be offered for those who would like to teach music privately at home.

The home economics department will offer an associate degree program in foods and nutrition.

Mrs. Jackson has an M.A. degree in art from the University of Oregon. She has met some of the requirements for a doctorate at the University of Oregon with graduate work also taken at the University of Maryland, University of Florida, Stetson University, Peabody College and the University of Arizona.

Mrs. Jackson has been a missionary and teacher in Hawaii and Alaska, a Bible instructor in Michigan, taught art at Highland Academy, Forest Lake Academy and Mainland High School before coming to SMC.

Her husband is Elder M. J. Jackson, now retired, but a former pastor and missionary.

Orchestra Gives Concert

Indeed, we are fortunate to have that type of student at Southern Missionary College," he adds.

Faculty Have Varied Talents

Varied talents turn up in unexpected places

among SMC's faculty.

Mr. Kenneth Davis, director of counseling and testing, is just completing work on a sauna bath in a corner of the women's recreation room in the basement of Thatcher Hall. The room itself is 10' x 12' in size, with upper and lower benches on three sides, which can accommodate 15 or 20 young women at a time. The bath has an adjacent dressing room and shower. The \$690 heating unit was donated by the Vico Company of California.

The men in Talge Hall have had a sauna since 1970, also made by Mr. Davis. It is open from 12

noon until midnight and is always in use.

Another with an unexpected talent is Dr. Melvin Campbell, head of the chemistry department, who is now teaching badminton as well as chemistry. He learned the game in India where it originated, and took classes and private lessons in how to play it.

Mr. Drew Turlington, chairman of the industrial education department, says he learned to bake bread in Florida during the depression years when money was scarce. Whole wheat flour was also scarce and so he went to feed stores and bought bran and shorts to enrich the white flour.

During World War II, Mr. Turlington made pastries at evacuation hospitals both in France and Germany.

More recently, while he was with the SMC Nicaragua Mission project during the summer, he baked bread and taught student missionaries how to bake bread in an army field range bought from army surplus. He also built cabinets for the kitchen in the mission house and made the counter top 34" high instead of the usual 36" so that it would be easier to knead the dough.
