CAMPUS RESEARCH DAY

Deadline for Proposals is Friday, February 28, 2020

Campus Research Day is April 16, 2020. We are looking for submissions from the 2019-2020 academic year. Proposals are due by Friday, February 28, 2020.

Although there is a competition component to Campus Research Day, faculty are encouraged to recommend student participation in presenting their works, either through oral presentation or poster. Participation in the competition portion of the event is not required in order to be a part of Campus Research Day.

Competition Participants

Interested students must submit proposals by Feb 28, 2020. Proposals are reviewed by the CRD committee. Authors of successful proposals will be contacted in late March to submit a working draft of their paper which will be judged by a panel. The top four papers in each of three areas (humanities, sciences, social sciences) will be selected to compete on Campus Research Day.

All presentations happen on Campus Research Day, April 16, 2020. Competitors will present their papers at 8:00 am. Winners of the discipline-level competition and poster session will present their work a second time at the dean's luncheon at 12:00 noon.

Non-Competition Participants

Interested students must submit proposals by Feb 28, 2020. All presentations happen on Campus Research Day, April 16, 2020. Sessions are held throughout the day.

Poster Session

This year's poster session will take place at 9:30 am in the South Atrium of the Collegedale SDA Church. Interested participants must submit proposals by February 28, 2020.

60,000 BOOKS ARE MOVED AS NEW LIBRARY OPENS

2-Year Nurses Will Stay Here

The entire Associate of Science Degree nursing program will be offered on the Collegeville campus this fall, according to Mrs. Del Watson, chairman of the A.D. Nursing Department.

Two major factors prompt the move of the program to Collegeville: lack of stable qualified faculty in Madison, and a nursing curriculum revision which will convert the current summer session to a practicum in several Seventh-day Adventist hospitals throughout the Southern Union.

In moving the program from Madison Hospital, numerous valuable learning experiences in the Nashville area will be lost. However, the faculty is moving rapidly to find comparable experiences in the Chattanooga area.

Most of the students are pleased to be able to remain on the main campus.

SMC Hosts Teachers

SMC held a workshop in pre-paring for elementary teachers from the southern states served by the college on June 8 to 12. Several area teachers also attended the workshop, which was sponsored by the Southern Union Conference and was directed by John E. Baker, reading specialist for the Spaulding Elementary School at Collegeville.

Approximately 65 teachers attended the workshop, and stress was laid on the phonics program for the first grade.

Assisting Baker was Mrs. Mildred Spears, also of the SMC staff.

Others teaching in the workshop were Mrs. Inez Myers, supervisor for the Georgia-Cumberland schools, and James Duke, supervisor for the Florida schools. They encouraged the teachers to make learning fun by teaching the "Learn-by-Reference Way."

The Big Move finally happened! Books from the A. G. Daniels Memorial Library started rolling on their journey across campus on Monday, July 6, guided by a crew from Buildings and Grounds and the library staff. One week later, the new library was open for business, although the move was not yet completed.

Moving 60,000 volumes from one building to another and keeping them in order from their original shelves until they were in place again in their new home was a tremendous task. Charles Davis, head librarian, described the process. "We took the books off the shelves in order and placed them on carts with wheels. Then we wheeled the carts onto a van, keeping the carts in order, drove to the new library and rolled them into the new shelving area where they were again placed on shelves, still in order."

"The first books to go over were bound periodicals, the reference collection, and books for browsing and general reading," he continues. "Next we took the Library of Congress collection and last the Dewey collection."

The card catalogue was moved on the first day, taking cards from 160 drawers in the old library and putting them into 360 drawers in the new facility, leaving room for expansion.

The actual moving of the books took five days. The move was completed by Friday.

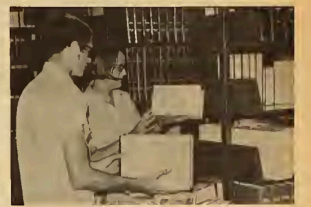

Construction is booming on campus this summer. With the new library nearly finished, the action has moved to other building projects, such as the new house for the dean of men behind Talge Hall, the new College Market, and renovation of the Campus Kitchen.

The old A. G. Daniels library building is being completely redone inside for the Math and Physics Departments and Computer Science, with tiered lecture rooms and fixed seating.

Third floor of Jones Hall and half of second floor have been converted into extra dormitory space for nearly 100 women. Downstairs, the English and Art Departments are expanding their office space into the area formerly occupied by Health Service.

Health Service will now be in

ers worked long hours overtime to get the books in place for use by the students in summer school. "I have really appreciated the work of the moving crew," stated Davis. "They have done a tremendous job."

Other materials which had to be transported to the new library were still being moved during the following week. Renovation of the old building, which is to be occupied by the Math and Physics Departments and Computer Science, is to begin immediately after it is vacated.

The present capacity of the new library is 100,000 books, and presently it is only 60 percent full. Davis predicts that it will be five years before new shelving must be added, and says that 300,000 volumes could be held in the building with the purchase of more shelves.

Two 1968 graduates of SMC, Gary Anderson and his wife, Glenda, were apparently killed in a Cessna 310 that crashed on May 30, just south of Mackinac Island, Michigan. They were the only passengers.
