January 10, Leland's brother died of a heart attack. No warning and on his birthday. We are glad his daughter Dee '62 was with him though it was hard on her. Janet and Stanford went with us to the funeral and we also saw Monty Straw. The changes for 1990 have begun early.

Going to the funeral was all very complicated as Grant Goodge, '61 was scheduled to give the Friday and Saturday evening programs that same weekend. I had asked him to come and was looking forward to it so much. But everyone volunteered to take over our duties. The reports from students and faculty about Grant's pictures and talks were very positive.

The latest news is Violet Goodge breaking her arm. We were at the lodge doing some spring cleaning and painting, so missed the excitement.

Now Prof has added the campus news to help me.

CAMPUS NEWS--Prof

We used to wonder what we would do when all the building and fixing was finished. Little did we know! The farm added a couple of new metal grain bins for wheat and oats, and replaced the wheat bin for flour wheat. A new and large pipe was laid from our holding tank for septic system effluent to the evaporating pond, no small project. Mr. Kenneth Straw's house is having the final finishing touches added by Jim Johnson. Concrete has been laid behind the cafeteria over past the deans' wing of the girls' dorm and a couple of baskets erected so the girls can exercise in their back yard. The service area of No. 1 greenhouse has been replaced with a neat looking building. We are having to change our gasoline tank and pump. They are now required to be above ground in a concrete basin large enough to hold contents of tank should it leak, or be in an elaborate double walled tank with complicated controls to detect any leak, if the tank is to be underground. A new pump house has been erected around the old building at the spring and a couple of new filters are being installed to replace the old ones we put in while Arthur Hale was here.

For quite a while we have been looking for replacement for our boilers that are so old no major repairs can be made. We finally found one at Oak Ridge that has twice the capacity of our present ones. A new boiler to serve our purpose would have cost over \$100,000. The one from Oak Ridge is the same as new as had never been used and has all the equipment for operation. The only cost to us was the \$20,000 to have it moved. It is a 200 plus horse power unit so should handle our needs easily. We consider it a miracle.

In the meantime we had an accident; one of our boilers, the Kewane, blew up, literally, the cause too complicated to explain here. Mr. Lee Dimick who answered the alarm signal at 3:00 a.m. was badly burned by the steam on his face and hands. He has made a really rapid recovery under the care of Dr. Watson and Ann Goodge '62 and is already out working again.

A larger room is required for the new boiler so Mr. Del Dimick is in the process of finding a replacement for the damaged boiler that can eventually be approved as a back-up for the larger one.

Our new gardener (we have had quite a turnover the last few years) has great plans for this year. He happens to be the Dean's (Ken Micheff's) brother. Dean's father-in-law (Del Smith) also helps about half time in the garden. Mrs. Dimick, Miss Gency and yours truly (not too greatly) have banded together to raise acres of food. Del Smith is growing broccoli and cauliflower in greenhouse #1 and Verna Dimick has flowers and hundreds of plants, tomatoes and other vegetables, in #2. Miss Gency and Jim Micheff were cutting seed potatoes this afternoon, and now looking for a place dry enough to plant. Jim plans to swamp us with sweet corn--15 or 20 acres. He is a go-getter and best of all is willing to seek counsel on what should be done, when. I must say we have some of the finest workers I have ever had the pleasure of associating with at present. I should add, we have been looking for a man to care for the shop and boilers. We really have missed Ray Weygandt. Well Mrs. Wilton's (san associate cook) husband finally arrived a couple of weeks ago. He had been promising to come as soon as he could sell his business. This will be a big help. I greatly appreciate not having to carry the heavy work now, but try to keep busy with the lighter tasks of maintenance and helping in the cannery.
