Dear Creekers,

This is a very sad newsletter for me. I am sorry for such a delay but have found it very difficult to write. Many of you know that Rogene '59 passed away on Tuesday evening, May 26, just shortly before sunset. The last three days of her illness were so hard for us. Jerry Hill was here when she died and he and Sharon Straw lowered the flag to half mast while I watched from our house.

The funeral was held in the Church at Little Creek at 1:30 P.M. on Thursday, May 28. We buried her in the rain at 47° - we chose to believe it was the angels weeping with us. We are sorry that more of you were not notified in time. Somehow confusion and exhaustion left us less than efficient.

Between writing each paragraph, I have been sitting here looking out the window of my newly enclosed back porch trying to guess how much detail you would be interested to read.

First, the entire family want you to know how much your outpouring of love and concern meant to us. Rogene answered every phone call, even when she was so weak we had to hold the phone to her ear. It meant so much to her. We tried to keep track of all the calls. My last count was more than two hundred and fifty phone calls--several from overseas. The word of her illness spread quickly. Somewhere between two hundred fifty and three hundred visitors--many alumni--came to see her fore she died. Space precludes listing each name, but they came from far and near. Perhaps the greatest distance traveled was by Jon Larrabee, who came from Hawaii with his three month old son. Besides the calls and visits, she received many flowers and hundreds of cards and letters--some too late for her to read. It seems that the last newsletter was slow being delivered. But your cards and letters were a blessing to all of us. (See separate letter from the Roger Goodge family for their special thanks to you.)

We are comforted that Rogene could be cared for at home. We moved a hospital bed into the living room and she was nursed and cared for by her family and friends. She was very brave, although it was hard for her to leave her mother and all of us she thought needed her.

We visited Eddie Zollinger '51 at Laurelbrook recently. We're happy he is home again from Hawaii. He has been fighting this monster of cancer for four years and we talked about how devastating it can be.

However, I shared with him some things cancer cannot do. Karen (Holiman) Jeske has been in the fight also and perhaps others may take comfort from these thoughts someone gave me. Cancer cannot destroy love, hope, memories, friends, our souls, our eternal life. We can still have peace, confidence and courage that those who have no hope cannot understand. Joy in the resurrection will be sure and lasting.

✓ven though God did not answer our prayers for healing, He faithfully kept His promise to help us bear ≥ pain. We wish we could answer each of you and thank you for the lovely flowers (Rogene's room) was filled with them), fruit, visits and prayers. You were all God's helpers. Someday we'll understand it all.

I'm trying to remember when Karen (Hiner) Holland '81 and husband Brian brought the choir and choir from Oklahoma Academy to give us a program. Karen is now the principal there as well as the director of music. We were just thrilled to hear the beautiful program and our students sensed the disciplined performance. I think they were here in February.

We were sorry to hear that Harvey Williams passed away recently. He had a serious stroke and did not live too long afterward. Our sympathy goes out to the family at this time of loss. In a letter from Betty (Williams) Allen '60, written before her father passed away, I quote, "Kimberly Goodge '88 was supervising the student nurse assigned to Daddy April 8. It was so good to see her. I just got to visit with her for a few minutes. She helped get Daddy ready to go to surgery that morning."

On a happier note, on June 14 the campus was all astir with preparations for Bruce Myers' '85 wedding, which was held at 11:00 A.M. There was a lovely reception afterward in the cafeteria. Rogene so much hoped to live to help with and attend, but that wasn't to be. We were happy she could give them her gift. Bruce married Lisa Heinsman. Her sister married James Gully '83, so this turned out to be a Gulley reunion as well as a Myers & McNeilus one. Alumni involved in the wedding included James Gulley, Brent Myers '78, Denzil McNeilus '79, Carl Sellars 83, Doug Dewey '85, & Jeff Hill '85, plus some other alumni-in-law & alumni children. Bruce and Lisa have moved into the girls' dorm as Lisa will be the assistant dean next year.

The John Dysinger '82 family, on furlough from Maxwell Adventist Academy in Nairobi, Kenya, and the Edwin Dysinger '77 family on leave from the self-supporting school in Mafinga, Tanzania, came to us. What fun we had hearing about their work. Since we visited the Riverside project when we w in Africa we were especially interested in Edwin's work which is similar--teaching health and agriculture. A recent letter from their brother, Wayne Dysinger '78 says, "We moved from Guam to Loma Linda last September so I could finish my preventive medicine residency. After the move, June decided she wanted to pursue a career in nurse-midwifery. She was accepted at Emory University, where she started classes this month (May). We will be in the Atlanta area for at least two years while she completes her course work. I will be working in Family Practice and Preventive Medicine in the Atlanta area.

Karen (Holiman) Jeske '68 has been nursing in Kender Adventist Hospital in Kenya, East Africa, for four years. However, her bout with breast cancer has been a trial for her. She returned to the U.S. this spring for reconstructive surgery and then hopes to pursue a course in midwifery at Loma Linda which will be helpful if she can return to Kenya. Remember her in your prayers.

David Hamilton '86 came to visit and I asked him to write a bit about his work. He says, "I am the editor-in-chief of *The Student Echo* at the University of Tennessee at Chattanooga and that's about it. I'm also the evening librarian at the Chattanooga Times and have written a few things for them over the past few years. It's kind of incredible how with three editors, three assistant editors, a copy editor and a computer (that will spell-check all of your copy) we still run into problems." Since writing the first part of this letter we have attended the memorial service for Eddie Zollinger '51 who lost his battle with cancer on July 7. Leland played Eddie's favorite song on his violin, *I Walked Today Where Jesus Walked*. Eddie spent about twenty-five years at Laurelbrook. His own family gave the service and told of his life which began with sorrow as his mother died when he was twenty months old. He came to Little Creek when he was in the fifth grade. The last few years he spent in Hawaii with his brother Glen '45. But he wanted to come home to Laurelbrook. Betty '44, Shirley' 43 and Bob '48 accompanied him home from Hawaii and he stayed with Bob for the last two weeks before he died. His whole family was with him during the July 4 week-end so he knew how much he was loved.

I wanted to say, "Remember, Eddie, what cancer can't do. We still have our memories of your beautiful life and our hope of seeing you soon when Jesus comes. Then we'll have all eternity together with your mother who hated to leave you."


ALUMNI ASSN SECRETARY

Dear Alumni,

We learned on April 27 that Rogene had cancer, but it was May 1 before we knew the extent of it. Rogene was looking forward to going to Gatlinburg that week-end with Doris Brown '56 and others of our family. So we took her in a wheelchair and even though she was very sick and failing she enjoyed the weekend and Mother and I drown her home via Townsend. Doris and Dad followed us home on Sunday afternoon and she and I brought a hospital bed home and fixed Rogene a place in the far end of the living room.

Rogene wasn't able to be out of bed after that except for going to the Thompson Cancer Center with Janet Straw and me for four radiation treatments; she was too weak to go for the fifth one.

We could never have made it without Nellie Keplinger, who stayed five weeks with us to cook and help look after things.

Although we know that stress does not cause cancer, the Doctor said that the stress Rogene had been under was a major factor in her illness and death.

Mother, Dad and I want you to know that we were touched with the outpouring of love and concern shown by so many of you.
