Program highlights include:



NEW PARTNERSHIP HELPS HISPANIC STUDENTS ATTEND SOUTHERN

Southern has launched a partnership with Equal Chance for Education (ECE), a Tennessee-based scholarship program that helps provide Hispanic individuals with an equal opportunity to achieve the American dream by

completing college. Incoming college students may qualify for an ECE scholarship of up to \$6,000 per year if they have a GPA of at least 3.0, are ineligible for federal funding, and have a defined career goal.

This partnership came about thanks to scholarship recipient and incoming-freshman Julena Camarena (see picture below). When Camarena applied for an ECE scholarship and was accepted, she was disappointed to find that her dream school—Southern—was not partnered with ECE. She asked if ECE would consider working with Southern, and to her surprise, they agreed. Since then, Southern and ECE have formed a partnership that will help financially insecure students find the funding they need to pay for college expenses.



"Working with this

program will help Southern find financial resources for programs and scholarships that support diversity on campus," said Stephanie Guster, senior advisor for diversity at Southern. "This program shows that there are highly capable students who want to be in higher education—who choose Southern—but who aren't eligible for federal funding. It's exciting to have a resource to assist those students!"

As a freshman at Southern this fall, Camarena is studying clinical psychology as she begins her journey to becoming a surgeon.

"I am a first-generation college student, so this scholarship is really important to my family as I build a future for myself," Camarena said. "Through ECE and Southern, I can see God's will working in me. I know this scholarship program will help others who are in the same situation have an opportunity to attend an Adventist university, too."

GRADUATE STUDENTS PROVIDE MUTUALLY BENEFICIAL FREE COUNSELING TO COMMUNITY

What first drew Katie (Milliken) Cramer to the <u>School of Education and Psychology</u> at Southern was the opportunity to study and gain practical skills in a welcoming, encouraging Christian atmosphere.

"The environment at Southern is so different from a state university—having prayers and worship in class calmed me and helped me to focus on each day," Cramer said. "I was able to form close relationships with the other students in my cohort, and we uplift each other, which has helped the process too."

Cramer is a master's student in the Professional
Counseling program, completing a dual specialty in
Clinical Mental Health Counseling and School Counseling.
She also works as a graduate assistant for the program.
She helps coordinate the Southern Center for Counseling and Emotional Wellness, an on-campus service providing community members with free counseling from graduate students.



"In addition to

helping the community, these services benefit our counselors-in-training," said Ileanna Freeman, PhD, professor and director of <u>Graduate Studies in Professional Counseling</u>. "The counseling practicum prepares students to practice counseling after graduation and teaches them to be responsible professionals, including how to follow the code of ethics and the normal procedures of counseling centers."

The program is accredited by the Council for the Accreditation of Counseling and Related Educational Programs (CACREP), and each session is strictly supervised by licensed professionals. During the school

year, approximately 15 counselors are available to help clients with issues such as mental health, relationship conflicts, and more. Cramer completed her counseling practicum during the Winter 2021 semester.

"Throughout my practicum, I could see how the techniques and skills I had learned in classes were working in my clients' lives and making a difference," Cramer said. "I trusted that the Lord would guide me through each session and help me know what to say and do. The process was a huge confidence builder."

Anyone is welcome to sign up for a free counseling session; appointments can be made by calling 423.236.2492. They are available in person on campus or virtually.

"The things I love most about counseling are the connections I make and seeing people grow emotionally and mentally," Cramer said. "Counseling is an art to learn, and not every session will go the same way. It helps

people realize different perspectives in their life and start the healing process."

MASTER OF SOCIAL WORK PROGRAM AT SOUTHERN INTRODUCES FULLY ONLINE OPTION

Students now have the option to complete their Master of Social Work (MSW) degree at Southern entirely online; Southern is the only Seventh-day Adventist university to offer this option.

"There are individuals outside of our geographic area who would like to graduate with a degree from a Christian university but may be unable to come here," said Laura Racovita, PhD, dean of the School of Social Work. "By offering this master's program online, we are expanding our reach through technology to provide quality Christian education around the globe."



Southern's MSW

program has used a hybrid format since 2010; however, when all courses temporarily transitioned online in 2020 due to the pandemic, leadership recognized a growing need for students to have the flexibility to participate fully online from wherever they live. This year Southern received permission from the Council on Social Work Accreditation to update the program's structure.

"We hope that students from all over the county and around the world will consider participating in this flexible program," said Lorri (Boyle) Merchant, '94, PhD, the MSW program director.

In addition to the 100% virtual option, students can still choose to attend in-person classes every other Sunday, with the remaining course requirements completed online.

"We strongly believe that offering our program online aligns perfectly with our university mission," Racovita said. "We can serve, help others, and empower individuals to change their world wherever they are, extending and expanding our influence beyond our local community."
