

SOUTHERN UPDATE

In the sixth year of its **Employee Wellness** program, Southern again offered free wellness assessments just before the school year started. Including participating spouses, 332 participated, 53 more than last year. A cash incentive awaited all who activated their wellness action plans throughout the semester. In 1993 the 152 employees who stayed active in the wellness program averaged \$1,343 in medical expenditures per person, \$3,000 below the national average for the year.

Aleksei Sokolov, professor of painting at the Russian Academy of Art in St. Petersburg, Russia, was a **resident guest artist** this fall. His son, Leonid, also exhibited his master craftsmanship in porcelain and pottery decoration. They assisted in art classes while here.

On November 19 a **Prayer Conference** was broadcast live by satellite from the campus to hundreds of locations across North America. It originated at the Collegedale church in preparation for Net 95, the inaugural satellite evangelistic crusade to be conducted by Mark Finley in Chattanooga beginning February 19.

Eight more years of accreditation for Southern's **A.S. nursing program** were unanimously voted on June 21 in New York City. This is the maximum accreditation length extended by the National League for Nursing.

Internet access is now available at over 150 campus workstations. Internet accounts are available without charge to students, teachers, and staff on campus. Electronic mail can be addressed to: postmaster@southern.edu.

Because Southern College was in the right place at the right time—midway between two other orchestral engagements—the **Slovak Symphony Orchestra** performed here October 25. This bonus concert became part of the first American tour for this group from the recently independent Slovak Republic.

With completion of the **Collegedale connector** between I-75 and Hwy 317, the primary access route to Collegedale has become more attractive as well as safer. Highway signage is being modified to encourage use of Exit 11 on I-75, by campus visitors, both from north and south. Distance to the campus from that exit is 3.7 miles.

PreviewSouthern, an autumn edition of College Days planned specifically for high school seniors and transfer students, brought 84 guests to the campus in October. Among them were 57 prospective students, 26 of whom had never visited the campus before. They came from as far away as Maine, Texas, Washington state, and Michigan. Among them,

34 turned in applications before they left. **ViewSouthern**, the traditional spring college days, will bring all the seniors at Southern Union academies to the campus on April 2 and 3. Others who missed **PreviewSouthern** may also arrange to visit then or at another time by calling 1-800-SOUTHERN.

A 10-keyboard **electronic piano laboratory** is now installed in Mabel Wood Hall. Equipped with Techniques Keyboards, the lab accommodates students in music theory, keyboard harmony, and group piano classes.

At the October 31 board, trustees approved construction of a fourth floor for the **student residence addition** which houses the Conference Center. The present flat roof requires replacement, and additional rooms constructed at the same time as a gable roof will add flexible residential space for future needs.

The biannual **Acrofest** in November brought 500 young gymnasts to a three-day gymnastics festival at Southern. Former world champions Eugeny Marchenku and Natalia Redkova of Russia participated. On Sabbath a youth festival, cosponsored by the Georgia-Cumberland Conference and Southern, brought in about 1,000 more guests.

This semester 368 students were "adopted" by **Secret Families**, a program initiated by deaconesses in the Collegedale Church. For several weeks small gifts and other remembrances were showered on specific students wishing to participate, then students met their "family" at a pizza party. During second semester 269 other students anticipate "adoption."

Seniors taking the National Teacher Exam in October achieved a 100 percent pass rate. Following up on the full five-year accreditation renewal granted to the three elementary and 13 secondary **teacher education programs** in 1992, the Tennessee State Department of Education confirmed in September that all recommendations have been met.

CAFETERIA RENEWAL

Students are appreciating a larger serving area, (shown are Stephanie Dodd from Ohio and Susan Scott from Florida) and a fresh look in the dining room. After twenty years the original golden wallcovering is gone. New carpeting was laid during the Christmas break. Aged chairs and tables were replaced. Doublepaned windows now cut heating and cooling costs.

The present food service-student center facility was added to Wright Hall in 1973.

The college cafeteria serves over 400,000 vegetarian meals a year.

Well known in church institutional food circles, food service director Earl Evans has been invited to serve as head chef for the 1995 worldwide General Conference session in the Netherlands.

A MONK A MARRIAGE A MIRACLE

Collegedale Church has held many weddings but none quite like on August 12. Nazih Yacoub, a former Coptic monk/priest from Egypt, married the pretty young widow of one of his former parishioners. Their story left new friends amazed.

Nazih arrived in Collegedale from Egypt having fled death threats for leaving the religion that had nurtured him for forty years. As a Coptic monk, he had been secretary for his monastery and eventually secretary to the Coptic pope. After ordination into the priesthood, Nazih was sent to pastor two churches in England

and then recalled to assist the pope's brother in administering the largest Coptic church in Egypt. Later, he pastored in Holland then returned again to the Zeytun Cathedral in Cairo when the pope's aging brother demanded his help.

The monastic life called for many prayer hours. Nazih also spent much time in Bible study and research. Ironically, his interest in Seventh-day Adventists was sparked by an article the pope wrote denouncing Adventists and Jehovah's Witnesses. He studied the Jehovah's Witness doctrines first and concluded that the pope was correct in finding error in that theology. But his

study into Adventism convinced him that its beliefs had scriptural basis. Nazih argued the matter with the pope and continued Bible study. As a result, he concluded that the monastic system and the worship of saints and confession were wrong. Alarmed, the pope demanded that Nazih return to the monastery for mind retraining. He refused and severed connections with the church.

The church retaliated by confiscating the house he had built with his own funds on monastery ground. Furthermore, the pope's brother warned the congregation not to have any more association

with the ex-priest or they, too, would be cut off from the church. In fact, he warned, if Nazih attempted to return to the cathedral, he should be killed.

The widow of one of Nazih's parishioners, Mervat Winess, had known him for several years. He had played with her children, been close friends with her husband, and nurtured their family spiritually. When Mervat's husband died, Nazih spent days helping her straighten out the estate. She could not bear to see him thrown out without resources and offered him shelter and assistance.

But after both she and Nazih had received several threatening phone calls, she helped him flee the country last March. She and her daughter joined him here in August.

Nazih had studied Adventist doctrine with Bruce Papendick, a minister in Cairo. It was Papendick's faxes to Dr. George Babcock and Dr. Jack Blanco that opened the door for Nazih to study ministry at Southern.

Nazih and Mervat were married August 12 in the company of about fifty new friends. So both the bride and groom could understand completely, the wedding service was translated into Arabic by

Wadie Awad, an Egyptian member of the Collegedale Church.

Nazih and Mervat were baptized at the Collegedale Church on December 17. In addition to his religion classes, the two are studying English. Their seven-year-old daughter, Christine, is making remarkable progress in Spalding's kindergarten class.

"God loves me," Nazih says confidently. "This is a miracle. For forty years I gave all my life and my time to Him. Now He has given me a wonderful wife and a daughter that I love very much. He has also given me His truth, and I love Him."

He would pick wild flowers on a Sabbath morning walk, make a sandwich in the cafeteria, then send both up to her room. "He won my heart, being such a sincere Christian and a handsome young man, showing his love for me in many ways," says Opal (Miller) Payne about her husband, Donald.

It was at Southern College, then Southern Junior College, in 1931 where their friendship began. And at that time, hand-holding wasn't allowed. On a school hike to Grindstone Mountain, they were permitted to walk together—while holding a stick between them. "Even stick holding thrilled us," says Opal.

She fondly recalls how close they were—memories of chatting at the campus laundry where he worked, a Lookout Mountain date (chaperoned by the wife of the men's dean), and the privilege of walking on the sidewalk together to supper after orchestra practice.

They talked about being together in the future, but they had no idea how far in the future. Opal graduated from junior college in the class of 1932, before Donald, and "he was wise enough to know that he could not support a wife—not since he had to work all his way through college," she says. So they parted.

She went to Emmanuel Missionary College, now Andrews University, and graduated again in the class of 1934. Donald went to Florida to take nursing and lost track of her. He married twice but lost both wives in death. Opal never married.

At Southern's Homecoming in October of 1990, the two crossed paths again. "When he saw me, he gave me a television show hug—then a tighter hug that gave me a silent message," she remembers. The next day, they spent time together with friends and family. "Sparks began shooting."

When the weekend was over, Donald returned to his home in Boring, Oregon, but they began to write each other. In April of 1991, he visited her for two weeks, and they got engaged. He immediately made plans for them to fly west so she could meet his family. In July, 60 years after they held a stick together, they were married. Don Sahly, president at Southern, performed the ceremony, his first wedding service as an ordained minister.

"I have never felt toward another man as I do Donald. In fact, I dreamed of him for years after we parted at SJC."

Donald and Opal's romance lives on in Collegedale. Donald is an avid bird watcher and has made bird traps for banding purposes for 40 years. Opal says she stays busy cooking for Donald and being a homemaker. "This is our home until Jesus comes."

Opal was an educator at the elementary, secondary, and college level. Donald practiced as a nurse. His daughter, Lee Ann Church, '76, and her husband, Monte, '65, graduated from Southern.

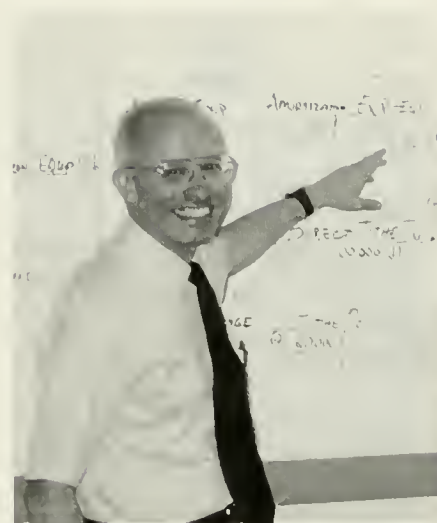
• **Carolyn (Wilson) Achata** has joined the Nursing Department. She has about two decades of experience in community health, the area in which she now teaches.

In partnership with Microsoft, MultiMedia Design, Yudan, and other corporations, the Department of Education and Psychology plans to equip the room with the very latest of technology available at greatly reduced cost. The target is to be operational by July 1995.



SEGAR TEACHES ACCOUNTING IN MOSCOW

"Have you ever seen a check?" an accounting teacher asked the 14 accountants and treasurers in his basic accounting seminar. Only two of them had.

The teacher was Jim Segar, professor of business administration at Southern. (His translator, Vladimar Chaplinski, attended Southern in 1991-92.) The accountants and treasurers were from Adventist church administrative offices in Russia, Belarus, Moldova, and Uzbekistan where most business is conducted on a cash basis.

Segar was invited by the Euro-Asia Division to Moscow last summer to assist with accounting education, as part of a larger program of integrating the division's activities into the world-wide work of the Seventh-day Adventist Church.

"Moscow University only recently established a program in commercial studies," comments Segar. "Remember, too, that during 70 years of communism, no one dared to keep church records because the KGB were ever watchful. Now we are trying to tell these people in the shadow of the Kremlin that they should keep careful records of money paid and received and the names of the persons involved!"

Concurrently, Segar's wife, Mary Lou, conducted a secretarial and office management seminar for division office secretaries.
